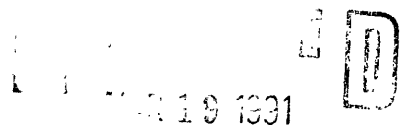

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The J.B. Gilbert House is located at 200 Fairfield Terrace in Hartsville. Built in 1929 and designed by J. Carroll Johnson, it is an excellent example of the Tudor Revival style. This house is representative of residences in Hartsville associated with the community's industrial, commercial, and civic leaders.

This two-story brick residence has an irregular plan and asymmetrical facade. It has a cross gable slate roof with two additional lower cross gables. Tall interior chimneys have decorative chimney pots. The projecting entry bay has a recessed arch entry with a decorative limestone surround. The red brick cladding is highlighted with limestone trim, decorative ironwork, half-timbering, and herringbone brickwork in the gables. The facade features a variety of single and grouped six-over-six, double-hung-sash windows. A decorative second story bay window is located to the right of the entry bay. An integral two car garage is located at the right rear elevation.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The J.B. Gilbert House is significant as an excellent example of an early twentieth century Tudor Revival residence; as a design of J. Carroll Johnson, a prominent Columbia architect of the twentieth century; and for its association with John Barton Gilbert (1891-1953), prominent Hartsville manufacturer and businessman.

It was built in 1929 by Gilbert, who came to Hartsville in 1919 from Alabama, where he had been a buyer for Avondale Mills. He was brought to Hartsville by Charles W. Coker, president of the Southern Novelty Company, later Sonoco Products Company. Gilbert served Sonoco first as a salesman, then an accountant, and finally as corporate treasurer, in which position he remained until his death in 1953. In addition to his work for Sonoco, Gilbert helped establish the Cornish Company in 1922. This company, founded in conjunction with other Hartsville manufacturers such as J.G. Cornish, Charles W. Coker, C.K. Dunlap, and P.L. McCall, manufactured industrial boiler and furnace linings. It became the Carolina Refractories Company when Gilbert acquired it in 1924. Gilbert also founded the Joy Silk Mill, with his brother Samuel C. Gilbert as president, in 1936. This mill manufactured ladies' silk hosiery until the introduction of nylon, when it manufactured various nylon goods such as hosiery and underwear.(1)

The house was designed by J. Carroll Johnson (1882-1967), a prominent Columbia architect of the twentieth century. Johnson, a native of Sweden, graduated from the Chicago Architectural School of the Armour Institute of Technology in 1906 and completed post-graduate work in architecture at the University of Pennsylvania in 1908. He came to Columbia in 1910 as chief draughtsman for Wilson and Sompayrac, and was most prominent as the architect of the University of South Carolina from c. 1922 to 1956. Johnson designed two other buildings in Hartsville -- Memorial Hall (1913), part of the Memorial Hall/General Service Building at Coker College (individually listed in the National Register in 1989), and the J.L. Coker, Jr., House (1924), which is being nominated as part of the East Home Avenue Historic District in this multiple property submission.
