Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated about three miles east of Natchez on the northern side of Liberty Road, Montpellier is a one-and-a-half story, square, frame Greek Revival residence. The gabled roof is pierced by two inside-end chimneys, and two gabled dormers that are pilastered with molded cornices are located on both the front and rear slopes of the roof. The southerly facade, which is composed of matched boards finished with an unmolded base, is fronted by a gallery supported by slender molded box columns, and the gallery ceiling is plastered. The columns were originally linked by a railing with molded handrail, now missing. The center bay of the five-bay facade contains the entrance doorway which consists of a full molded entablature supported by molded pilasters. The double-leaf doors, each containing one molded and fielded panel on the exterior and two molded panels on the interior, are surrounded by a transom and sidelights set over molded and fielded panels.

The floor plan of the house is a double-pile plan with central passage, the rear portion of which widens to become the dining room. All rooms of the downstairs are identically trimmed. The doors and windows have architrave surrounds with two fasciae, the bases have two fasciae and are molded, and the doors are four-paneled and molded. The rear doorway, located in the dining room, echoes the front entrance doorway. The house features only two fireplace openings, one located in each of the two front rooms, and each has its original wooden mantelpiece. The Tudor-arched mantelpieces are unusual for Greek Revival residences in Natchez.

The most outstanding architectural feature of Montpellier is its partially open staircase, which is entered on the southern wall of the dining room. The stair begins in an open quarter-turn with graceful curve and continues through an enclosure toward the front of the house to terminate in the upstairs hall. The bottom newel is turned and the balusters of the open portion of the stair are turned and tapered. The two newels at the head of the stair are partially turned with ball finials, and the stairwell is railed by rectangular-sectioned balusters.

The two upstairs bedrooms and hall are more simply trimmed than the The door and window surrounds have architrave surrounds with downstairs. only one fasciae and the bases are beaded. The doors are four-paneled and molded except for the original board-and-batten closet doors located in the hall and bedrooms.

The rear gallery of Montpellier has been enclosed to accomodate a modern kitchen, den, and bathroom. Otherwise, the integrity of the house is remarkable. Almost all original hardware, which includes porcelain door knobs and brass escutcheons, survives. No original outbuildings remain, but a small family cemetery is located about 2,000 feet to the rear and north of the house.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Montpellier is an architecturally significant Adams County plantation residence in the Greek Revival Style. This significance derives from its high degree of finish and its remarkable integrity. Its most outstanding architectural feature is its partially enclosed staircase, and unusual for Adams County are its Tudor-arched wooden mantel pieces. An 1873 inventory of the furnishings of the house and the plantation equipment provides an excellent resource for studying the domestic life of the smaller Southern planter (Adams County Probate Box 191).

Montpellier was probably constructed for planter Charles Whitmore not long after 1843, the year in which he acquired the section of the plantation upon which the house is located (Deed Book DD:632). Whitmore first purchased part of Montpellier Plantation in 1828 (Deed Book Q:330), probably shortly after his arrival in America. According to the 1860 census records, Whitmore and his wife were born in England, and, at the time of his death in 1865, Whitmore still owned property in England and had money in English banks. The name Montpellier was first used to describe Whitmore's American property in his 1864 will (Will Book 3:232), in which Montpellier was bequeathed to Whitmore's only child, Sydney Charles.

Sydney Whitmore married Mary Pendleton of Adams County (Joseph B. Stratton, his unpublished diary, Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, entry dated April 16, 1862) and resided at Montpellier until his death in 1873 (Probate Box 191). An inventory of the plantation was made at the time of Sydney Whitmore's death (Probate Box 191), and, in 1875, the house was sold by Mary Whitmore to settle her husband's estate (UU:368). The second \underline{L} in the spelling of Montpellier was dropped after the death of either Charles or Sydney Whitmore.

In 1915, Montpellier Plantation was purchased by Mrs. Mary Lizzie Mock (Deed Book 4E:437), whose daughter, Mrs. Arthur Fowler, and granddaughter, Miss Sue Caroline Fowler, reside in the house. Montpellier has been beautifully preserved by the Fowler family during their residency and is one of the most significant of the Adams County plantation residences.
