The Shreveport Post Office and Courthouse is a large rectangular four story and basement structure with a hipped, red tile roof. The principal or S. East facade faces Texas street and is composed of a granite base and a rusticated limestone first story, divided into nine bays by Doric palasters, doubled at each end of the facade. Each bay contains a large semi-circular head opening, the three center ones forming the entrance to the post office lobby, approached by a broad flight of steps. Above the decorated renaissance Doric cornice is a balustrade course with turned baluster inserts in front of each of the second story windows. These nine tall casement windows have moulded, decorated terra cotta frame surmounted by a cornice, the center window being further embellished by a curved pediment with an inscription and flagpole bracket. The third story windows have similar moulded frames without cornices and are nearly square in shape. Above the third story windows is the principal cornice which surrounds the building. The terra cotta cornice is also of decorated renaissance design with modillions and like the first story cornice, is surmounted by a balustrade course, this is a low attic story with rather small square windows with moulded frames. A small cap moulding and gutter terminates the attic story and Above the third and fourth story windows are small ventilating grilles. The corners of the building above the first story are emphasized by rusticated terra cotta quoins. The walls above the first story are of brick stuccoed with terra cotta trim.

The Marshall street or S. West facade is similar to that on Texas street, but with ten bays and a single entrance in the end bay at the Texas street corner. The N. East and N. West facades face service alleys and are similar in design to the others, except that in the center of the N. East facade in the post office leading platform with an overhanging canopy.

The post office lobby, parallel to Texas street, repeats the bay spaces of the exterior with inlaid marble pilasters and handsome dome-vaulted ceiling. The upper stories contain office space and a large courtroom.

The building was originally only half its present size and only three stories in height. Blue prints of the original plans and photographs taken during construction and soon after completion (on file in the office of the building manager) reveal that the building originally had only five bays on both the N. East and S. West facades and that the tile roof rested on the third story cornice without the present fourth or attic story. The post office loading platform was located in the center of the north facade, being recessed into the building, the bay spacing being continued across the recess by the introduction of four round Doric columns. A metal canopy extended out from these columns over the loading platform. When the building was more than doubled in size by the north addition and fourth story, the work of matching stone, terra cotta and stucco work was so well done that it is almost impossible to tell that any changes had been made to the original structure.

This building in the Italian Renaissance style is an important example of the ecolectic architecture of the early twentieth century and one of the most architecturally impressive buildings in Shreveport. Its location in the downtown area diagonally opposite to the Caddo Parish Courthouse gives it added significance in the urban scene. The plans were prepared under the direction of James K. Taylor, Supervising Architect, Treasury Department and are dated February 28, 1910. Work was begun that year and completed in 1912. The original site was acquired on April 12. 1884 and a brick, Victorian style post office building erected. This was demolished when the present building was built. Plans for the extension and remodeling, dated March 16, 1931, were prepared under the direction of James A. Wetmore, acting Supervising Architect, Treasury Department. The contractor was Algernon Blair. The building reflects a high quality of design and construction in governmental buildings in the early years of the twentieth century and its construction and enlargement are reflective of the growth and importance of Shreveport during these years.
