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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Holly Street Livery Stable is a simple brick building of unusual shape created by the curvature of the adjoining Santa Fe Railroad right-of-way (which is still in use) creating an interesting trapezoidal floor plan of 100 ft. x 50 ft. x 80 ft. x 53.85 ft.

The structure is constructed of high one story load bearing masonry walls, 18 inches in thickness, with concrete floors and the original wood truss and wood beams supporting the original wood roof. The wide wooden barn doors under a shallow masonry arch centered in the front facade of the Livery Stable (along Holly Street) remain as original equipment of the building.

The original hayloft supported by wood beams and wood floor is located in the East section of the structure. Visible from the rear of the building, it is presently used for the storage of furniture. The hayloft is accessable from the main floor by both ladders and by one of the original wooden staircases. The presence of the hayloft can also be seen from the outside of the structure; the original double wood doors open onto Holly Street directly from the loft on the second level for the loading of hay to the waiting horse drawn carts below.

All of the structure's window and door openings are original and include: two small recessed window openings of 2 ft. x 4 ft. on either side of the recessed double wood hayloft doors at the hayloft level, and a pair of large double wood sliding doors suspended on the outside face of the building by a metal track, the original wooden barn doors located in the shallow masonry arch in the center of the building's front facade, and a single entry door with an adjacent window also recessed under a shallow masonry arch on the West side of the central arch on the building's front facade. The West wall of the structure contains five small openings including: a small double-hung window recessed in a shallow masonry arch and covered by one of the original cast iron metal grids, a small cast iron grid covered opening five feet to the South of the arched opening and three attic vents directly below the roof of the structure covered by metal louvers. The South wall of the structure, the rear facade, contains another large arched opening with a set of recessed metal doors replacing the original double wood doors, a smaller shallow arched opening with a large rectangular hayloft opening above are located to the East of the larger arched opening. Two small openings are also located on the South wall of the structure including a 2 ft. x 3 ft. window recessed in another shallow arch opening at six feet above the main floor level and a similar sized recessed arched opening located six feet above the hayloft level. The East side of the structure contains three small recessed window openings covered with original cast iron grids located three feet above the main floor level and three attic vents located similar to those directly under the roof on the West side of the structure covered by newly installed sheet metal cover plates. A small masonry chimney is also located on the East side of the building projecting approximately four feet above the shallow pitched roof, located above the original masonry fireplace.

The Livery Stable's design is based on many functional requirements relating to the use and is therefore not representative of any strong architectural style. The structure's interior character has been well preserved, although most all of the original interior furnishings have been removed. The structure also bears several faded markings of former uses which can still be identified including: Pasadena Spring and Bumper Company, Pasadena Painting Contractor, and most importantly, The Pasadena City Market, the first occupant of the building.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Livery Stable is one of the last remaining and one of the best preserved examples of the non-mechanized era of transportation in Southern California. The structure serves a dual significance as a local part of Pasadena's commercial history and as a reminder of the change in transportation modes in the region.

The Holly Street Livery Stable is located on an isolated site at the periphery of Pasadena's commercial center, where livery stables were once common. The stable is adjacent to the site of the original Pasadena Star Newspaper Building which was destroyed by fire in the late 1930's and is now a vacant lot to the west of the Livery Stable. The site is also located on the north side of Pasadena's historic commercial center within the Old Town District (a planning designation). The building has been identified as a potential renovation project.

Although the Livery Stable has had many uses, its first use as a stable is remembered by local residents. John Breiner, proprietor of the Pasadena City Market, used the structure to house the horses and wagons for daily grocery deliveries. Blacksmithing also was done on the premises. References were made to this site in a number of early Rose Parade programs as the site for hitching horses to wagons participating in the parade. The stable is significant to Pasadena's local history as a float construction site for the first Rose Parades. The introduction of the horseless carriage in Southern California soon after the construction of the Holly Street Livery Stable led to a succession of uses. The uses included: a Red Cross Thrift Store during World War I (tin can toys were made here to support the war effort), and ironically, during the 1930's the stable was occupied by a car repair shop, the Pasadena Spring and Bumper Company; today the building is used as a furniture warehouse. The different uses of the building are discovered as the brick weathers and the painted signs emerge.

Architecturally the stable is important for its brick construction (common bond) and its unusual shape. It is notable for its trapezoidal shape, and clean, simple horizontal lines. The assymetrical fenestration provides the interest of the building. As the only structure over 80 years old in this area, it is the best example of brick construction. The odd shape results from fitting the building to the lot located next to the railroad tracks. This rather ordinary commercial building is distinguished as an example of local builders using a common building material and adapting the plan of a barn/livery stable to fit an unusual site.


