DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The one and two story building is of stone wall construction. Textured white plastered walls, a columned entrance lanai and a dominating high pitched tile roof characterize what has come to be known as the "Hawaiian" architecture which developed during the 1920's and 1930's. The interior is arranged around five open courts surrounded by exhibit galleries. Each court reflects a different character, the most distinctive influences being that of the Spanish and Chinese. A unique architectural harmony is achieved while portraying distinctly different cultural influences.

Except for the addition of a wing in the mauka, ewa corner in 1960 to house educational offices and lecture halls, the building is in its original form and in excellent condition.

The building is extremely successful in providing a pleasant atmosphere for viewing art. A strong character is exerted by the building, yet in no way does it compete or distract from the art works displayed. The Art Academy building is an outstanding example of a museum built in harmony with the climactic conditions of Hawaii. The wide lanais, open courts and high pitched roof provide coolness and shape as well as ease of movement throughout the building.
