Summary Paragraph

The Lafayette Heights Historic District is located approximately 1 3/4 miles northwest of Downtown Mobile. A late 19th and early 20th century neighborhood, the district is representative of such developments in Mobile during that period. Lafayette Heights continues the 19th century grid pattern that characterizes most of the city. The area is well shaded with oaks and pines and contains approximately 141 acres.

Narrative Description

The proposed Lafayette Heights Historic District is located 1 3/4 miles northwest of the downtown area and consists of 357 primary resources (356 buildings, 1 site) covering an area of approximately 141 acres. The district is bounded on the north by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue, on the east by Rylands Street, on the south by Springhill Avenue, and on the west by the terminus of Basil Street.

Lafayette Heights (1892-1963) developed as a late 19th and early 20th century working and lower-middle class neighborhood. The development of the area follows typical late 19th and early 20th century planning. Blocks follow a mostly grid-like pattern and average approximately 340 feet by 350 feet with a few having been combined into two noticeably larger blocks of 1,650 feet by 340 feet. The streets are asphalt paved and mostly concrete curbed. The majority of streets are flanked by concrete sidewalks. Most streets average a width of 30 feet, although Springhill Avenue and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue are major thoroughfares that are approximately 55 feet and 40 feet in width, respectively. The streets are lined with rectangular lots averaging a frontage of 50 feet by 150 feet deep. Occasionally, lots have been doubled or subdivided. Houses in the district are set back 15 to 20 feet and with informally landscaped yards. The topography of the area is unique in that it rises gently from a point beginning at Rylands Street at 24 feet above sea level and slopes upward to 38 feet above sea level at the terminus of Basil Street. A bluff of 30 feet marks the western boundary. It is this feature that gives the district its name.

Housing forms and styles throughout the district reflect the range of styles and forms popular from 1892 to 1962. Most of the housing forms found in the district include one story bungalows, contemporary, Foursquare, irregular, L-plan, Minimal Traditional, Ranch, rectangular plan and shotgun. These forms often appear in a variety of styles such as Late Victorian, Classical Revival, Colonial Revival and Craftsman. A variation of Foursquare, the Working Man's Foursquare, is found scattered throughout the district and requires further explanation. These residential structures were defined by Alan Gowans in his book, The Comfortable House, as maintaining the form and layout of the larger, two-story Fourquare with pyramidal hip roof, but only being one story in height.

The district is primarily residential, with 334 (94%) out of 356 resources constructed as housing. Residences are concentrated throughout the district except along Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue and Springhill Avenue. Most of the residential buildings are one story in height with a few one-and-one half story and two story examples. The majority of all resources are frame construction. The remainder are typically brick veneer, brick faced tile, or concrete. The nonresidential resources include one hospital and a few churches and businesses. The hospital is a significant example of the International Style and was designed by the architectural firm, McCauly and Associates (located in Birmingham, Alabama). McCauly and Associates were noted for their hospital designs throughout the United States.

The contributing archaeological site in the district consists of the entire area included within the district boundaries. Some of these vacant lots in the district once had dwellings, while others have never been developed. The vacant lots are mostly overgrown with grass, and some have trees. Both these lots and the developed lots have the potential to yield information about the growth and development of the neighborhood.

Inventory

The following information was compiled from historic research and field surveys by Mr. Shaun Wilson, a Preservation Consultant with the Mobile Historic Development Commission. Beginning in October 2011 and progressing through September 2012, Mr. Wilson did a thorough survey of the entire district, photographing and describing both the contributing and noncontributing buildings.

Most construction dates are circa, based on the period of development of the particular street on which the building is located and the architectural characteristics of the building itself. In the case of exact dates, these were obtained by city directory references, title and tax record research.

Other sources include published material from the Municipal Archives and unpublished material maintained in the files of the Mobile Historic Development Commission. The majority of outbuildings were not counted as they are small, utilitarian in design and located at the rear of the properties, where they could not be clearly seen from the street. However, garage/apartments located near the street were counted. Buildings in which porches have been enclosed for additional living space have been counted as noncontributing; whereas those with screened porches have been counted as contributing.

Inventory Key

Each property description begins with an inventory number, which runs sequentially upwards. The address follows, then the date, then the name of the business or church if relevant, then the architectural description. Finally, the NR photo number of the photograph depicting the property where appropriate, followed by a "C" for contributing and "NC" for noncontributing.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance and applicable criteria.)

The Lafayette Heights Historic District (1892-1963) is locally significant under National Register Criteria C for its large, mostly intact collection of late 19th and early 20th century architecture. The buildings in Lafayette Heights have not been significantly altered, and the district retains a strong sense of time and place. The appearance of the district has not been significantly altered, and it retains much of its historic character.

Lafayette Heights is also locally significant under Criterion D: Archaeology. Although no formal archaeological survey has been made of this neighborhood, the potential for subsurface remains is high. The ground level remains, Sanborn maps and City Directories indicate that buried remains within the boundaries of the proposed district may yield useful information on the extant historic buildings, those buildings that once occupied these lots and the history of its residents.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least one paragraph for each area of significance.)

The Lafayette Heights Historic District is locally significant under Criterion C for architecture for its large concentration of late 19th and early to mid-20th century houses. Late 19th century architectural styles include Late Victorian and Classical Revival. Early to mid-20th century styles include the Four Square, Colonial Revival, Craftsman/bungalow, Minimal Traditional and early Ranch homes. The diversity of styles reflects national tastes, but also illustrates regional influences. Raised brick pier foundations, large recessed or projecting porches, low pitched roofs with wide eaves and extensive use of windows and doors for light and ventilation are common, local features. This did not change until the advent of central air and heating, which resulted in housing styles and forms that more closely followed housing trends in the rest of the country regardless of geographic location.

The area developed during the same period as a number of surrounding districts, namely the Old Dauphin Way and Campground Historic Districts, which borders Lafayette Heights along its southern and eastern boundaries, respectively. These areas to the west of downtown Mobile were particularly noted for their new development in the 1903 *Mobile Register Trade Edition*. It is in this regard that Lafayette Heights serves as a valuable local example of the evolution of architectural styles during the late 19th to mid-20th centuries in Mobile.

The district is also locally significant under Criterion D for archaeology. The entire district encompassed within the boundaries of Lafayette Heights comprises one archaeological site. The ground level remains, Sanborn maps and City Directories indicate that buried remains on the vacant lots could provide useful information on the historic buildings that occupied these lots. Archaeology in Lafayette Heights also has the potential to assist in addressing several key issues pertaining to the district. First, archaeology can help in identifying the construction and developmental phases of the district. Secondly, it can identify social factors affecting change in the neighborhood. Third, archaeology can show how the district was interrelated to the neighborhoods surrounding it and how its development affected the history of the evolution of those neighborhoods. Finally, it can support efforts in identifying significant individuals and events important to Mobile. Archaeology, therefore, has the potential to add another dimension to the investigation into the development of Lafayette Heights and the lives of the inhabitants.

Developmental history/additional historic context information (if appropriate)

The Lafayette Heights Historic District consists of two principle subdivisions; namely, the Lexington Heights Subdivision (Deed Book 70,26(1892) and the Lafayette Heights Subdivision (Deed Book 133,420)(1907). These two subdivisions have since been added to or re-subdivided into five others that include: the Dr. Gordon Subdivision (Deed Book 114,434)(1903), the Wilson 9th Addition (Deed Book 156,119)(1915), the FL Roche Subdivision (Deed Book 156,469)(1925), the Robertson Subdivision (Map Book 96,55)(2002),

and the McKinley Subdivision (Map Book 113,29) (2006). Between 1892 to the 1980's the district maintained the separate designations for Lexington Heights and Lafayette Heights. A few residents still refer to this division; however, it is now generally referred to as Lafayette Heights. The Lafayette Heights Community Action Group represents the entire area. The earliest map of the area, kept at the Mobile Municipal Archives, is the 1907 Towle Map.

The streets in the district were platted from the late 19th century to the early 20th century and are set to right angles with each other in straight lines. These streets appear to be an extension of Mobile's original grid plan running from the urban core to the rural countryside. An examination of city atlases from this period reveals that it was the terminus for Mobile's original grid plan in the northwestern portion of the City (1907 Towle Map). This grid plan is typical of residential planning for that period. The lots have been divided into typical, residential size lots.

The area encompassing Lafayette Heights remained relatively unsettled until the very late 19th century. It did play a significant role during the Civil War; however, as the City's earthwork defenses were located in this area (Campground Historic District NR nomination, 2004). The fact that the westernmost edge of the district ends in a 30 foot bluff meant the area was well suited for Mobile's defense (Ibid, 2004). The Campground Historic District, which abuts the eastern boundary of Lafayette Heights, was named for the encampment area for the Confederate soldiers and only serves to illustrate its importance. Mobile's fortunes declined after the Civil War. The port silted up and trade dwindled. Cotton no longer proved to be as lucrative a venture as before the Civil War and failed speculative ventures resulted in Mobile going bankrupt in 1875. The City had borrowed heavily to finance various improvement programs; and as a result, its debt had climbed to a staggering \$5 million dollars. It was not until the latter half of the 1890's that Mobile began to recover. The port diversified with timber and fruit being important products (Thomason 10/23/2003).

By World War One the City was again prospering and it is reflected in census data. The population of the City in 1890 was some 30,000. By 1920 the population had doubled to 60,000 (Craig and Kallsen, 1997). The resulting population growth resulted in new housing developments on the edges of already existing neighborhoods (Towle Map, 1907).

City Directories from the 1920's through the 1950's reveal a mostly working to lower-middle class neighborhood. Also, they reveal the area was split between African-Americans, mostly living in the eastern section that abuts the Campground, and whites, mostly living in the western section. Lafayette Street seems to have been the dividing line. However, information is not available after 1951, as the directories stopped identifying race after that date. Occupations typically found in the area include: laborer, seamstress, superintendent, carrier, clerk, and technician.

The downtown area was within walking distance and public transportation in the form of a streetcar line existed on Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue and Springhill Avenue (Mobile Light & R.R Company Map, 2005). A few relatively prosperous residents lived in Lafayette Heights as evidenced by their homes which reflect the larger late 19th-early 20th century house forms and popular styles. These homes are located mostly along Lafayette Street. Smaller and less elaborate houses were constructed for the working and lower-middle class residents. There was steady growth in Lafayette Heights until World War One and World War Two. These two events resulted in a rapid increase in the district's population as workers entered the city to work at the shipyards (McLaurin & Thomason 1981, 95 & 106).

A number of late 19th century cottages and shotguns are located in Lafayette Heights. The oldest of these are located in the eastern portions of the district (214 Lexington Avenue c. 1900 Photo #1). This follows the general pattern of development as the oldest platted section is in this area. This portion of the district was also predominately African-American. Given the economic disadvantages they faced, these buildings are often rather modest. There are larger and more elaborate examples in the area around Lafayette Street (218 North Lafayette Street c. 1900 Photo #2), but, as noted earlier, this area was predominately white. These cottages and shotguns (1409 and 1411 Congress Street c. 1900 Photos #20 and 21) do exhibit typical regional characteristics found throughout Mobile's

late 19th and early 20th century neighborhoods. These include: raised brick pier foundations, recessed or projecting porches, and large windows.

The 20th century saw several new styles of architecture grow in popularity. Craftsman/bungalow style houses (1464 Center Street and 1504 Delusser Street c. 1930 Photos #8 and 9), which promoted a respect and aesthetic for the natural qualities of wood, brick, stone, stucco, and tile, comprise a large part of the district's early 20th century architecture (Gould 1988, 247 & Baker 1994, 114). Another, simple early 20th century house form, the American Four Square, is also present (304 N. Lafayette Street and 306 Robbins Street Photos #11 and 12).

The bungalow was one of the more popular building forms constructed in the area after World War I. It was built in many variations depending upon geographic region (Baker 1994, 117). Bungalows in Lafayette Heights are most frequently modest buildings and continued to remain popular until 1940. Additionally, a few Period Revival style houses (170 N. Lafayette and 172 N. Lafayette Street Photos #6 and 7) were constructed in the district during this same time frame. Minimal Traditional houses (305 Robbins Street and 421 Lexington Avenue Photos #14 and 15) began to appear in the years just prior to World War II and remained popular until 1960. Early Ranch homes (1561 Basil Street and 1508 Center Street Photos #17 and 18) were built in the late 1950's, and they continue to be popular today. These were built on the few remaining vacant lots that were available in the western portions of Lafayette Heights, and sometimes replaced older houses in the neighborhood.
