Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Constructed in 1835, the Cavellero House is located in Mobile's Central Business District and is directly adjacent to the Lower Dauphin Street Commercial District. The building occupies the small 31 foot front lot and is 2 1/2 stories in height rising directly from the sidewalk. There is a one story right rear wing.

The Cavellero House is Federal in style and is constructed of brick with 5 rows of stretchers alternating with one row of headers. Federal characteristics include the gable roof with ridge running parallel to the street set between low fire wall parapets; a left hand chimney rises from the parapet; a dentil frieze at cornice level is present above a brick string course. The facade is four bays wide and essentially symmetrically arranged. At the second story level four windows are present. They have been modernized through the substitution of 1/1 lights for the standard 6/6 lights that would have been originally present and is still present in the dormer and end gable window. Flat brick arches are still visible above the window openings and there is a very narrow wood sill beneath each window. At the right hand side, the window has been sealed in the lower half.

On the first floor, the original entrance way was located in the north bay with its dimensions indicated by the flat headed brick arch still visible in the wall. A smaller door, added at some point over the years, has resulted in the partial bricking in of the original entrance. A secondary entrance, also added at an undetermined date, has resulted in the alteration and enlargement of what was originally a window opening.

One of the most distiguishing features of the Cavellero House is the dormers which exhibit refined detailing. These dormers have broken pediments supported on pilasters which form the framing for 6/6 light windows. The upper window lights have segmental headings. At the rear slope of the roof are two additional dormers which also have the broken pediment detailing. However, repairs appear to have eliminated the pilasters and replaced them with plain boards.

On the basis of available maps, it appears that a two story wood gallery had been added to the building between the years 1873 and 1880. However, by 1925, this gallery had been removed. No imformation has been uncovered to date that sheds any light on the design of this gallery.

Interior:

The interior of the first floor is a single open space with no evidence of any original hardware, baseboards, molding or lighting. The entrance door is not original. The floor has been covered with linoleum tiles.

The upper story and a half has not been viewed.

8. Significance



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

ARCHITECTURE:

The Cavellero House is architecturally important to the City of Mobile. It is the oldest surviving Federal style building in the downtown area. Despite alterations along the facade-which include changing window lights, eliminating one window to install a doorway, and altering the original entrance--the overall massing, scale, and exterior details illustrate the buildings Federal origins. The treatment of the parapet walls, the dentil table at the cornice and the regular organization of the facade are all in keeping with the Federal style.

The building is typical of much of the commercial property in Mobile's nineteenth century business district. While commercial enterprises were conducted on the first floor, shopkeepers maintained their residences on the floor(s) above. This was a common practice in the buildings in the Lower Dauphin Street Commercial District, which is directly adjacent to the Cavellero House.

INTEGRITY:

The exterior modifications to this building are not so severe that the original integrity of the building could not be restored. Fine features such as the dormers with their broken pediments have been retained. Dimensions of the original doorway can still be ascertained by examining the brick work.

On the interior, little calls to mind this building's 1835 construction date. The large open space of the first floor does not appear to retain any original architectural features such as hardware or moldings.
