DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The present Saint John's Cathedral Was constructed 1905 - 1911. Eighteen architects submitted designations for a Gothic cathedral in a national competition. Tracy & Swarthout New York were commissioned architects.

Moved

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The apsidal structure consists of chancel, a nave of 16 bays, narthex and two matching towers at the portal. Material is dressed Indiana limestone from the Bedford quarries. Length of center aisle is 185'. Height floor to roof is 65'. Towers are 100', housing a peal of 14 bells and a great bell. 16 aisle windows, 16 clerestory windows (32'), 11 chancel windows, Last Judgement above the portal- represent a hundred years of glass design by English and American artists. The chancel is furnished with a <u>Romanesque</u> altar screen of oak and 16 figures carved in Oberammergau c. 1881. Stones from the foundations of Canterbury Cathedral and Westminster Abbey are set into the narthex walls.

Saint John's Cathedral and the nearby Cathedral of the Immaculate Conceptiom represent the Gothic Revival in American church architecture. The cathedral provides architectural space of a high order; it also demonstrates the aspiration which guided urban development of the Donuen community. The Late Cathic Devivel building is suict

Denver community. The Late Gothic Revival building is quiet and dignified in design. The English Perpendicular inspiration and the monochromatic use of the stone further emphasize the grandeur and dignity of the structure.

The present cathedral structure is the second cathedral and third parish church of Saint John's Church in the Wilderness, Denver. This congregation was the first church organized in the mining camp of Denver, Kansas Territory on January 29, 1860. The parish still operates as Saint John's Church in the Wilderness under a special charter granted by the Territorial legislature in 1861. The Anglican system of administration, in which a cathedral provided a centalized and visible place of authority for the Bishop of a diocese, was suspect in post-revolutionary America. Churchmen who labored to maintain the worship of the church in their new republic were wary of monarchical forms. Thus, while the history of Denver is recent, Saint John's Cathedral, Denver is the third Anglican cathderal in the western hemispere. In 1879 The Rt. Rev. Hohn Franklin-Soulding, Bishop of Colorado and the Rev. H. Martyn Hart, Recter of Saint Johfs's agreed to establish a cathedral system in the new state and diocese.

Dean Hart, an Englishman, built in Denver two cathedrals, sponsored the community welfare, education and morality. His grave lies outside the eastern wall of the cathedral.

After 1925 the Deans and vestry of the Gathedral have commissioned architects and artists of Denver to design and furnish its chapels and adjoining buildings, and have sponsored music for the community in addition to liturgical music.

Since 1940 the Cathedral has sponsored or opened its doors to civil rights organizations. The Unity Council, formed by Dean Paul Roberts here, became the founding force for Denver's official Commission on Community Relations.

- ART: The stained glass windows are the primary source of significance in this field. They represent the work of masters from Hampton Studios in England and from Cambridge in the U.S. and from Kerbritton Studios locally. Overall, one is speaking of a one hundred year collection of glass art. Furhtermore, there is the commissioned wood work art, frescoes, and the like that decorate the chapples and the main church.
- ARCHITECTURE: The design of the church is Late Gothic Revival and resulted from the popular national competitions for designs at the tmmn of the century. It was the winning design of the 17 that were submitted.
- MUSIC: The choirmasters that have served the church have been, almost without exception, outstanding composers. They have included such famous names as Dr. Hohn Gower, Karl Stapp, Dr. Robert Finster, and Kenneth W. Douglas, who composed and edited the Episcopalean Church Hymnal now used as the standard for church music in the nation and is even known internationally.
- SOCIAL/HUMANITARIAN: The church and its individual members have always been leaders in the humanitarian efforts in Denver. They have given unstintingly to the needs of the poor, to those suffering from disasters like floods and crop failure, and to the missions. The church is a leader in Denver Philanthropy, and has always strived to be the example for charity efforts.
