

Central Owenton Historic District Description

The Central Owenton Historic District is located in the center of the oldest part of town (see map 6), and includes the business area of W.Seminary from Main to Madison (see photos 1, 2, 3, & 4), the loof Building and the jail at Seminary and Madison (see photo 5), the Courthouse Square (see photos 6, 7, 8, & 9), and the business block of North Thomas from Bryan to Seminary (see photos 10, 11). The majority of the buildings date from the 1890s through 1905, with some earlier examples such as the jail and the Courthouse, and several buildings constructed between 1905 and 1925. All of the buildings within the district serve commercial or governmental functions. All but the Arnold Building (site 5) are of brick; most are two-story. The prevailing style is eclectic, with details reflective of turn-of-the-century decorative elements. The later additions are compatible in terms of scale, materials, and placement in the streetscape.

A description of the district boundary may be found in Item 10. Map 7 shows both the legal boundaries of properties within the district and the directions from which photos I through II were taken. The district boundaries were chosen to enclose the most cohesive section of the central business are. The blocks west of the Courthouse Square (with the exception of the jail) and north of the Courthouse Square no longer retain their historical or architectural integrity. Although both areas retain their commercial function, they are made up of modern intrusions (such as parking lots and late 20th century buildings) and historic buildings which have been significantly altered and no longer reflect their original appearance. There is one non-contributing element within the district boundary. This is 101-103 North Thomas Street (site A,see foreground photo 10), built in the 1940s.

All of the remaining buildings within the district are contributing elements. Most have been altered to some degree over the years, but all retain a sense of their original architectural integrity. Individual survey forms for all numbered sites (see map 6) are included as accompanying documentation.

Boundary Description and Justification

Beginning at the NW corner of the Owen County Jail lot (see map 7 for point of origin) and proceeding south along the western property line, then east along the southern property line and crossing West Seminary Street to the NW corner of the IOOF Building lot (205-207 W.Seminary). Then south along that western property line and east along the southern property line, crossing Madison Street to the western property line of 169 W.Seminary. Following that western property line south to the southern property line, and then east along the southern property lines of 169 through 137 W.Seminary to the western side of S.Thomas (Court) St. north along S.Thomas and crossing east to the southwest corner of 135 W.Seminary. Continuing east along the southern property lines of 135 through 101 W.Seminary, and then north along the eastern property line of 101 W.Seminary to its northeast corner. Then west along the south side of W.Seminary, crossing north to the southeast corner of 101 N.Thomas (Court) Street. Then north following the eastern property lines of 101 through 125 N.Thomas to the south side of Bryan Street; west and then crossing north to the southeast corner of 106 W.Bryan. Continuing north along the eastern property line of 106 W.Bryan and then west along its northern property line to the east side of N.Thomas Street. Then south along the east side of N.Thomas to the northwest corner of the First Farmers' Bank Building (127 N.Thomas). Crossing N.Thomas and continuing west along the northern property line of the Courthouse Square; then south along its western property line and crossing west at Madison Street to follow the northern property line of the jail lot to the point of origin.

Central Owenton Historic District Statement of Significance

The Central Owenton Historic District is significant as the focus of government and commercial activities in Owen County. The district contains the best collection of commercial architecture in the county. The central business district around the Courthouse Square was comprised of a variety of commercial buildings (see map 4). Only three of the present buildings on W.Seminary predate the fire of 1893, and all were damaged to some extent. Although the Kemper, Ransdell and Co. Drugstore (site 3, also photo 3) dates to c.1880, it is difficult to determine its original fabric. This building survived the 1893 fire and another in 1919, and currently retains its 1920's appearance. The other two survivors are Herndon's Hardware Store, c.1892 (site 10, also photo 2), and the Farmers' National Bank Building, c. 1885 (site 9, also photo 2). Both are fine examples of late 19th century commercial style. The bank was built in the Italianate style, with a decorative cornice and hoodmolds over the windows. Herndon's is still in use as a hardware store (now Minch's) and retains its original architectural integrity on both the exterior and interior.

The fire of 1893 demolished the remainder of the 100 blocks of W.Seminary Street, but business men were quick to rebuild. A major addition to the business area was the new Masonic Lodge (site 7, also photo 3), built in conjunction with the IOOF in 1894. This large eclectic building housed the lodge halls on the upper level and was rented for commercial use below. The IOOF also built another building for commercial rental, at the corner of Seminary and Madison, in 1898. It is also done in the poular late 19th century eclectic style, with corbeled brickwork and other decorative details (site 2, also photos 5 and 6).

A group of professional men--doctors and lawyers-- built their offices c.1895 in the heart of the central business district (site 8, also photo 2). Although constructed as two separate buildings with a common fire wall, a common front facade was remodeled in the early 20th century. Other commercial buildings along W.Seminary that add to the late 19th century appearance of the district include the Fullilove Building, c.1898 (site 11, also photo 1); Berthel's Restaurant, c.1898 (site 12, also photo 1); and the Henry Block, built by Dr. D.S. Henry in 1899 (site 6, also photo 3).

Owenton's commercial prosperity continued into the early years of the 20th century, and a number of commercial additions were made to the central business area near the Courthouse Square at that time. Some of the early 20th century buildings were a continued response to the fire of 1893. The Knights of Pythias built their lodge hall in 1903 at the southwest corner of Seminary and Main (site 14, also photo 1). The building is in the same popular eclectic style as earlier examples on W.Seminary, and was designed for lodge use on the upper story with the lower level rented for commercial purposes. A small brick building was constructed next door, also in 1903. Built for Otho Carroll as a barber shop, it is of indeterminate style with simple eclectic detailing (site 13, also photo 1).


The Peoples' Bank Building (site 19, also photo 10) was erected at the northeast corner of N.Thomas and Bryan Streets in 1902. This large brick building with richly detailed front facade also housed the post office, local telephone exchange, and a variety of other commercial functions. To its east, on W.Bryan Street, is an early 20th century store building, constructed c.1903 (site 20). Although changes have been made to the facade, this small commercial building adds to the early 20th century sense of time found at the northeast corner of the central business area.

Central Owenton Historic District Statement of Significance Continued

The adjacent block of N.Thomas Street, across from the Courthouse experienced a destructive fire in 1909. All of the commerical structures on this block post-date the fire. The First National Bank built its new facility on the north end of the block in 1909 (site 18, also photos 8 & 10). An example of early 20th century ecelectic style, the bank was remodeled in 1965 but retains much of its early appearance. The neighboring two commercial buildings were consturcted c.1910-15. Charles Marshall built his Ford dealership next to the bank, with the car lot to the rear (site 17, also photos 8 & 10). Although the building has a new storefront, it is an integral part of this early 20th century block. The Fullilove Building, next door (site 16, also photo 10), also adds a sense of style and time, with its typical design of street level store and apartment above.

That same building style can be found at the opposite end of the central business area, on W. Seminary Street. A fire in 1919 destroyed the western part of the block opposite the Courthouse, and new stores were built to replace those lost. The Arnold Building (site 5, also photo 3) is the only concrete structure in the Central Owenton Historic District. Built in 1920, it has new siding on the lower level but retains its original sense of scale and design. Next door, Mollie Stonestreet built her store c.1922 (site 4, also photo 3) in a similar style.

The 1920s marked the end of Owenton's commercial prosperity—due to a variety of modern technological advances and a drop in population—and there has been little change in the architectural component of the town since that time. Owenton still serves as the government and commercial center of Owen County, and the present—day city, particularly the down—town area, appears much the same as it did in the early part of the century.

The majority of Owenton's late 19th and early 20th century buildings are still in active use. Because it remains historically intact and continues to reflect its original sense of time, Owenton's architecture stands as an important and informative historical record of a small Northern Kentucky commercial center.

Upper arched windows are shuttered. North facade has metal sheathed addition at lower story; three arched windows with grillwork above. The hip roof has overhanging eaves on brackets; the chimneys are corbeled brick. The front vestibule leads to the jailer's quarters below and the cells above. Interior woodwork appears to be intact. Lot is raised above street level; stone retaining wall on south side, iron fence in front.

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and Thomas for \$1000. In July of 1875, a contract was let for \$8,992 to build the jail--H.P. McDonald, a well-known architect from Louisville, was selected to design the building. The jail was completed in June of 1876 and was occupied immediately by the first jailer, J.E. Lineback. The Owen County jail was in use until recently; at the present time there are plans to adapt it for county offices and possibly a museum. The Owen County Jail has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places since 1977.

been in the Walker family since 1918. Early Sanborn maps identify the western portion as a drugstore (1886, 1893, 1898, 1903, 1908 maps), with the eastern portion used for a barber shop, grocery, offices, and other commercial uses over the years. The building was badly damaged in the fire of 1893, and again in the fire of 1919. The majority of the rebuilding and remodeling seems to have been done in the 1920's after the last fire. The building is currently used for small business on the lower level, with apartments above.

fires of 1893 and 1919. Hartsough sold the badly damaged building to Robert Shkolnik in 1920; he then sold it to Mollie Stonestreet in 1922. Either Shkolnik or Stonestreet demolished Hartsough's building sometime before Mrs. Stonestreet built the present building in 1922, with commercial space on the street level and apartments above. Catherine Stonestreet inherited the building, and sold it to H.F. Deming in 1969.

The flanking wings (added 1868) are one story. brick on ashlar foundation. Windows are 12/12; the double doors have transoms, and steps leading up to them. The ends of both wings are blind, with windows front and rear. The west facade is 7-bay, divided by brick pilasters. Unlike the front facade, which is a variation of the Flemish bond (header-stretcher-stretcher-header), the remainder of the building is common bond brick. Windows on the west facade are 12/12 double-hung with brick segmental arches and plain sills. There is a brick string course above the upper windows. The east facade is the same as the west, except there is a fire stair to the second floor. The rear facade is 3-bay, divided by brick pilasters. A double stair leads to the rear entrance, a double door with Franklish Landithing transom. Windows are 12/12; the lower have shutters and the upper middle is partially bricked over. Brick string course above upper windows. The box cornice continues around the entire building and across the rear gable end, forming a pediment. The interior of the main building has a center hall with offices to either side on the first floor. The front lobby/vestibule has benches for visitors and the entrances to the wings, either side, which house offices as well. The double stair has a turned balustrade and leads to the court room above. The Courthouse is located on a raised square area which has been landscaped.

W.C. Cook, was engaged. Work was completed in 1858. During the Civil War, the building was used as a barracks by Union troops. The wings were added in 1868. There have been a number of small alterations over the years, such as the addition of restrooms and other modern improvements in 1930; repairs to the windows after a tornado in 1973; replacement of the outside doors in 1974; and the exterior white paint which was done in 1976. The courthouse is still in active use, and retains much of its original integrity inside and outside. The Owen County Courthouse has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places since 1977.

In its early years, the building also housed a number of commercial functions in addition to the Peoples Bank. The post office was located in the building during the early years of the 20th century (per Sanborn maps, 1903-1925); also the telephone exchange office and other offices.
