## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Judge Barnes (cf. No. 8) hired Jewell Hicks of Texarkana (TX) and Durant (OK) as architect for his house, R. D. (Bob) Cheatham as the prime contractor. Hicks was a one-time associate of Solomon Layton, Oklahoma's best known architect. Cheatham, a master builder, was responsible for construction of some of the more significant structures in McCurtain County and southeastern Oklahoma. The four-story (with basement and full attic) was under construction for more than 14 months between 1911 and 1912. The local paper admitted June 27, 1912, that it might seem "unreasonable" for a house in Idabel to take more than a year to build, "but such is nevertheless true." And went on to say that when completed "it will be without question one of the finest structures of architecture in the state of Oklahoma."

Of wood construction over a full concrete and brick basement, the 23-room house (7 in the basement) is in a neo-romantic Greek Revival style, with subdued Victorian over-tones. Two circular towers feature the front corners of the comfortably gracious old home. A graceful, balustraded veranda wraps its way around the north and east face of the house, protected by a column-supported, balustraded, second-floor balcony, part of which is in turn protected by the extended north gable. There is a screened porch across the back of the house.

The seven rooms on the first floor are finished in quartered cak, hand dressed and polished. Hardware throughout the house is that originally installed. The parquet floors are of seasoned ash, hand dressed and filled. The windows are of leaded glass, much of which is the original.

The second floor contains a sitting room, six bedrooms, and a bath. Woodwork is yellow pine and cypress with edge-grain flooring. Windows are also of leaded glass. The house was wired for electricity when built and also contained indoor plumbing - among the first in Idabel to contain such amenities.

The house generally was constructed of the best materials available at that time and in that relatively isolated region. It was well maintained over the years and the present owner, artist Harold Stevenson Jr., who bought it from the Barnes family in 1973, has carefully restored it to its 1912 condition with proper respect for historical integrity. Fortunately, it had undergone no structural changes and the minor changes he has made pertain largely to the utilities, appliances, and such. Some of the rooms he has furnished with the proper period antiques, others with furniture and furnishings collected from around the world.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Judge T. J. Barnes came to this extreme southeastern corner of what was then the Choctaw Nation, Indian Territory, about 1898. A lawyer, he settled first at the "court town" of Goodwater, moving to Garvin in 1902 when it was the provisional seat of McCurtain County, prior to statehood. He moved his thriving law practice to Idabel when it became county seat. In 1907, when Oklahoma Territory and Indian Territory were joined to become the 46th state, he became a candidate for the office of county judge.

He was elected Sept. 17, 1907, and helped to organize the first county government. Although he resigned in 1911 to return to his private law practice and by now expanding business interests, his effectiveness and competence as a judge is indicated by the fact that none of the cases he presided over were ever reversed by higher courts of appeal. On the record he was an acknowledged authority on Indian land title matters and probate actions, both common judicial activities in the early years of the county.

But Judge Barnes played an active role in other aspects of community life. In 1908 he helped organize one of the first banks in Idabel, serving as its first president. For a time he published a newspaper. He personally financed construction of some of the first permanent (brick) business buildings in Idabel, many of which still stand. Active in politics, he helped finance and press a state-wide campaign to amend the state election laws. He organized and served as first president of the McCurtain County Bar Association.

Judge Barnes was, in short, one of Idabel's outstanding early-day citizens, public spirited and in the forefront of all civic improvement efforts as they developed. And his gracious 65-year-old home - one of the first of a half-dozen or so similarly impressive "mansions" built in the booming new county seat during this period (another is the Spaulding-Olive House, placed in the National Register in 1976) - is an altogether fitting memorial to the man himself.
