

- 4. Owner: Joseph Valdez, 1011 Calle La Resolana, Santa Fe, N.M., 87501.
- 7. Description: Rectangular shape, long side to street; sandstone foundation; rusticated light brown ashlar sandstone walls (front), random ashlar (sides), dark brown sandstone quoins; wood shingle roof with two shed dormers, wood shingles on dormer; small enclosed overhang; 2/2 double-hung windows with dark brown sills and lintels; single door with transom and lintel. Located on what originally was a residential cul- de-sac near the railyards, which became the main route of U.S. 85 after the Second World War.
- 8. <u>Significance</u>: This house, built before 1902, represents the end of one development and the beginning of another. It is one of the last notable uses of the local stone for a residence; after the establishment of a local brickworks in 1898, brick became the common choice for substantial residences, leaving more expensive stone for institutional building. The hipped roof was new, however, coming from the restrained profiles of turn-of-thecentury classical revivalism. It is difficult to say whether the symmetry of the mass, paired chimneys and windows represent the continuing influence of the Greek Revival center hall plan or comes from the emphasis on compositional balance of the contemporary wave of classicism.
