The Scott and Wilson Houses District comprises a group of four brick townhouses built between 1878 and 1890. They are Victorian in style, of quite similar size and scale, and are very much alike except for subtle variations in trim. Wide plain square hoodmolds accent upper-story windows, for example, and are segmented on the lower, with the exception of the house at 336 where the lower story has flat arches with curved raised centers. Other interesting details include original spindle-turned porches on the houses at 328 and 330 South Mill.

They are landscaped as a unit, have basket-weave brick walks, and are enclosed by the original wrought-iron fence and gates.

The house at 324 South Mill Street originally had a recessed door like the other houses in the complex. Around the turn of the century the present porch with Corinthian columns was added. It has an overhanging roof with rising sun motif in the tympanum, brackets in the eaves, and hoodmolds over the windows.

The house at 328 South Mill Street has had little alteration since originally built.

It has a recessed doorway, an overhanging roof with rising sun motif in the tympanum, brackets in the eaves, carved wooden trim and hoodmolds above the windows. The design of the window and door trim is subtly different from its neighbors in the complex. The attractiveness of the structure is enhanced by the presence of trees on the lot.

The house at 330 South Mill Street has a recessed door and overhanging roof with wooden brackets in the eaves. The gable is treated as a pediment through the application of a deep cornice. There is a rising sun motif applied to the tympanum. The windows have brick voussoirs with monolithic hoodmolds. There is a land-scaped parking lot to the rear of the property.

The house at 336 South Mill Street (Thomas J. Wilson House) seems slightly earlier in style: the sunbursts on the other houses give a Queen Anne flavor in contrast to the residual Italianate brackets; vertical incised lines within the hoodmolds are also characteristic of the 1880s. Other features include a recessed doorway and overhanging standing seam tin roof with bracketed eaves. It utilizes the same gable space less fully than the other houses in the complex, there being only ventilating louvers surmounted by a hoodmold in this space. The floor plan is typical of a three-bay townhouse. Though the house is Victorian, interior woodwork, all of which is original, relates more closely to the Greek Revival period. There is a spiral stair. The recessed door, which is arched, opens into the stairhall. The front parlor has an iron mantel related in style to the late Greek Revival ones of marble. Behind this room is the dining room with a matching mantel. The ell has been converted into a kitchen. Woodwork in the ell matches that of the rest of the house. There is a pleasant porch attached to the ell overlooking the garden. The exterior north wall of the house has slits two courses tall for ventilation of the crawl space under the house. The curving stair climbs to the upstairs hall,

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Scott and Wilson Houses District is significant because it represents a group of Victorian townhouses built in the period 1886-1890 that are still standing today relatively unchanged since they were built. They have been used continuously for the past eighty and more years for residential purposes. Important to note too is the fact that the Wilson House was originally owned by a black laborer, making South Mill Street an early example of a post-Civil War integrated neighborhood. The block of 300 South Mill Street in which the houses are located is, in addition, an important residential area of old Lexington.

The Scott and Wilson Houses occupies land that once surrounded Rokeby Hall. a large mansion built around 1817-20 that faced High Street to the north. Rokeby Hall was first occupied by Samuel Trotter, son of Colonel James Trotter of the French and Indian Wars and a very early resident of Lexington. Samuel Trotter was a successful merchant and manufacturer. In 1835 Rokeby Hall was acquired by Chief Justice George Robertson (1790-1874) of the Kentucky Court of Appeals. Justice Robertson's career also included serving in the House of Representatives from 1817-1821, the Kentucky House of Representatives from Garrard County (1822-26), and from Fayette County (1848, 1851-53), Secretary of State for a short period under Governor Thomas Metcalfe, and professor of law at Transylvania University. Following Robertson's death Rokeby Hall property was sold to John W. Scott in 1874. In the period 1886-1890 the mansion was divided and surrounding property divided into lots. The property passed to Dr. John W. Scott and Elizabeth S. Scott, his heirs, who built the houses at 324, 328, and 330 South Mill Street and sold them shortly thereafter. A study of Sanborn Insurance Company maps of the period reveals that these houses were built in the period 1878-1890.

The property at 336 South Mill Street was sold to Thomas J. Wilson, a Negro laborer, in September 1878 and he built his house there some time before 1886. Intensive research into journals and histories relating to this period has been unsuccessful in providing additional information related to Mr. Wilson. Nevertheless, this seems to be an interesting case of racial residential integration in the late 19th-century Lexington.


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
