Colonial House is a seven story brick apartment structure built in a "French Colonial" style. The structure is well-appointed, its detailing providing a measure of quality craftsmanship invested in the building. The facade is symmetrical, with a vertical emphasis maintained by the placement of the windows. Windows are original; most are small-paned casement style with little ornamentation. Frames, recessed slightly in the brick facade, are painted white. Many windows, especially to the side and rear of the structure, are flanked by green shutters, each incorporating a shamrock design. Bay windows are also a feature of certain units.

A low pitched roof caps the building, which decreases in height one story at a time as one retreats from the street. The brick facade, which has been sandblasted, is ornamented by several ceramic medallions, possibly portraits of French explorers. Elsewhere one can see brick grilles in various patterns used for ornamentation. Such cut-outs are also incorporated into the brick work on the terrace.

The courtyard and landscaping are very supportive of the French style and well-maintained. The multi-level terrace has an intricate brick pattern. A fountain with two cherubs is the central feature. Ceramic urns, decorated with floral motifs, cap the brick wall. Wrought iron balconies overlook the garden. Some units have larger wooden sunporches. To the right of the terrace is a grassy lawn and pool, its brick decking supportive of the building. Originally this area housed a tennis court and rose garden.

The interior of the building has been altered very little, and retains several fine details for which the architect is noted. Entrance is gained by progressing up a brick walkway under a green canopy to a small arched portico. The main entrance is framed by pilasters and has sidelights. All fixtures are brass. Door plates throughout have the CH logo engraved in brass. The small foyer begins the motifs carried throughout the building, with its carved moldings and wainscotting. A row of gleaming brass mailboxes appears on one wall, as does the telephone used by the doorman in former years to summon tenants' cars from the underground garage to the porte cochere area. The central feature of the lobby is the wrought iron circular staircase, which ascends to the seventh floor. A small panelled elevator with carved moldings is also distinctive.

While the interiors of the twenty units differ somewhat, each displays basic design features which unify the building. Brass lighting fixtures and door handles, carved moldings, beamed ceilings (some incorporating the medallions of the facade), and French fireplaces are in evidence. Many units retain the original tile in kitchens and baths, a glass tile in an intricate geometric design. Built-in shelves and niches for telephones add to the ambience of each unit, as do French doors, built-in buffets, and walk-in closets. Carved moldings and beams enhance the larger units, as do two-story cathedral beamed living rooms with raised hearth fireplaces. All units have the same carved window and door frames; most have wainscotting in at least one room.

8. Significance



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In order to accomodate a large segment of the film industry whose work took them both to New York and California, the Hollywood community built a number of luxurious apartment hotels. These hostelries sought to maintain the highest levels of service to their prestigious clients, at the same time providing a home-like atmosphere. Such buildings dot the Hollywood landscape; many, however, are but shadows of their former selves. One such building which has not lost its place in the community is Colonial House, which continues to serve a function closely allied to the original. Now a condominium, it still provides a sense of place in a secluded environment to its residents.

The architect, Leland Bryant, was an architect, engineer, and inventor. A native of California, he attended the University of California at Berkeley. He designed a number of apartments in period styles, his favorites being the French Colonial and the French Chateau styles. Among his buildings in the Los Angeles area are: Sunset Towers (1929), the Voltaire (c. 1928), Country Club Manor (1926), Crystal Pier Beach Club in Santa Monica (1926), Le Trianon (1928), the Fontenoy (c. 1927), and the Spanish La Leyenda. Bryant is noted for his Class A construction, his care in engineering, and the amount of detailing which graces his buildings.

Colonial House was begun in 1930, one of the last of its kind to be finished before the Depression hit California. One of its original owners was actress Margaret Livingston Whiteman, wife of band leader Paul Whiteman. From the beginning, the luxuriously appointed building attracted personalities from the film industry, among them Clark Gable, Frances Marion, Nicholas Ray, Joan Blondell, Eddie Cantor, and currently, Bette Davis and Audra Lindley. Its location and the privacy it afforded made it popular with the film industry. In addition, a number of professionals, public relations people, producers, writers, and directors made Colonial House their home. An oral history detailing the residents is attached.

The Colonial House is significant in the Hollywood community not merely by virtue of its famous residents, but also for its period architecture and the visual symbol of an era. The advent of talking pictures focused the eyes of the world on the emerging community, and its boosters were determined to create a city that would look as glamorous as it was rumored to be. Throughout the Twenties, they committed themselves to an expansive and lavish building program, in both commercial and residential areas. The apartment hotels played a major role as visual symbols of the sophistication of Hollywood. Colonial House has retained this role, continuing as an example of architecture in Hollywood's heyday and representing a lifestyle which to a large extent has disappeared.


