Epping Forest is an impressive stuccoed structure built in the eclectic Spanish-Mediterranean style which was popular in Florida in the 1920's and 30's. The house occupies a prominent place amidst beautifully landscaped grounds and it has a commanding view of the St. John's River. There are extensive docking facilities in the river in addition to a large boathouse. Other structures located on the grounds include a five-car garage with servants quarters above, a pumphouse and a guest house. Elaborate fountains, walkways and railings are found throughout the terraced gardens.

All buildings are constructed in like manner, with stucco exteriors and barrel tile roofs. The plan of the main house is an elongated rectangle with the main halls running northsouth. * The first story contains large living and dining rooms, library, porches and extensive food preparation quarters and pantries. On the second floor are the bedrooms, each with its own bath.

The exterior of the building has an abundance of surface ornamentation such as is found in the Spanish Plateresque style. The main facade is embellished with heraldic devices and bas relief decoration. Windows are haphazardly placed and in some cases protected by iron grilles. A square tower is the focal point of the main facade. It houses the main entrance which actually takes the form of a portal. Spiral columns on bases flank the doors and support a hood mould with heraldic motif below. At the tower's midpoint a blind ogee arch frames two round arched windows which are glazed. The tower is pierced at the top by triple ogee arches occurring on all four The upper one third of the tower is defined by wide cornice mouldings which wrap like bands about it. Wrought iron lanterns hang on either side of the doorway. The double doors are heavy hand carved wood with the tympanum above being filled with a wrought iron grille. To the left and right of the tower a pavilion projects from the wings. This portion of the building is embellished with a small balcony with iron railing, French doors flanked by columns, heraldic motifs and a round window with tracery.

The interior of the house is as elaborately designed as the exterior. Massive ceiling beams, tile fireplace surrounds and a marble hall and staircase add to the grandeur of the structure. A portion of the duPont art collection is still kept in the house as well as the original furnishings

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Epping Forest was designed for Alfred I. duPont in 1927 by Harold Saxelbye, a prominent Jacksonville architect. The house was built at the time of Mr. duPont's marriage to Jessie Dew Ball, and was occupied by them until the time of their respective deaths. The plans and drawing for the house are currently in the possession of Saxelbye, Powell and Roberts, Architects.

Alfred Irenee duPont was born May 12, 1864, the greatgreat-grandson of Pierre Samuel duPont de Nemours, the French statesman and founder of a distinguished American family, and great-grandson of Eleuthere Irenee who established the powder mill which grew into one of the largest explosives companies in the world. Alfred attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and subsequently entered the family's powder works. After thoroughly learning the process for the production of explosives he applied his mechanical ingenuity to the improvement of the machinery and processes employed. In 1890 he purchased a tenth interest in E. I. duPont de Nemours and Co. and when the business was incorporated in 1899 he was elected a director of the company. His interest having extended beyond the explosives industry, duPont withdrew from its management in 1915 after having greatly increased the company's assets.

During the depression, Alfred I. duPont brought new enterprise to Florida. After many vacation visits to the State, he established his legal residence here in 1926. At the time there were many valuable properties available to large investors at fairly low prices. In 1926, duPont bought hugh quantities of timberland in West Florida which became the basis for the present St. Joe Paper Company. In addition, he acquired control of the Florida National Bank in Jacksonville and in 1929 he became the principal owner of a group of Florida banks. In 1930 when "the banking structure of the state was tottering on the edge of near ruin", duPont had the resources to protect his banks from the crisis. duPont's entry into the banking field was seen by many as a cause for economic upturn in the State. During this period, he was one of the largest single investors in Florida real estate and he is credited with

having increased property values in Florida by many millions of dollars.

During Mr. duPont's later life he was involved with many projects of a philanthropic nature. He gave vast sums of money for the care and treatment of crippled children. Alfred I. duPont died at Epping Forest on April 29, 1955.
