Jacob Wilhoyte was born in 1816, a son of Evan Wilhoyte who had come from Culpeper County, Virginia, to Jefferson County about 1808. The family moved to Oldham County in 1824. Numerous branches of the Wilhoyte family were found in Oldham County in the nineteenth century. They were descendants of the original Wilhoyte immigrants to Virginia from Germany who settled what were known as the Germanna Colonies. The house was owned by the Wilhoyte family until 1949.
