# 7. Description

This 10.4 mile section of state-maintained Route 66 serves as a frontage road for local traffic. Except for a subway in which the road passes under Interstate 40, deviating from the historic alignment for less than a quarter mile, it represents the alignment of the completed road project of 1933 and is marked by five concrete culverts and three reinforced concrete slab bridges. These structural elements as well as the original cross section template and surrounding landscape contribute to the historic feeling of Route 66 that this road section conveys.

Passing through the Parajito Creek Valley with Mesa Rica to the north and Palomas Mesa to the south, Route 66 remains on relatively flat terrain at an elevation of about 4,300 ft. As a result few bank or slope cuts mark the road. Several sections, however, are marked by raised grades with the culverts and bridges permitting water from small intermittent streams to flow into Parajito Creek just to the north.

Of particular interest are the road section's three bridges. Located 6.0, 7.2 and 8.0 miles west of the eastern end of the road section, each is a single-span measuring approximately 40 ft. in length and consisting of a reinforced concrete beam construction with concrete abutments. Each bridge has a 24 ft. wide concrete deck flanked by concrete curbs and reinforced concrete railings. WPA project number plates are affixed to their headwalls.

As the road approaches Montoya, it diverges from its close parallel with I-40, passing a series of small roadside businesses, now vacant and some deteriorating, as well as the Montoya cemetery. Combined with other landscape elements including the nearby railroad grade and the low telephone line paralleling the road, this portion of old Route 66 evokes a strong feeling of travel across rural New Mexico. With the exception of the subway and a few cattleguards, little of the

1930s-era road has been altered.

8. Statement of Significance

This road section was realigned from an earlier course in 1933 under FAP 5 (REO). This "reopening" of road work for further improvements is a good example of the Bureau of Roads' "staged construction" policy discussed in the historic context section of the Multiple Property listing and, particularly with its bridges, illustrates the changes New Deal road building projects brought to Route 66. It served as Routes 66 and 54 (coinciding with 66 from Tucumcari to Santa Rosa) until it was replaced by I-40 following the Interstate Highway Act of 1956. This section of state-maintained Route 66 is significant for its association with the rise of automobile tourism in New Mexico and thus is eligible under Criterion A.

10. Geographical Data

Verbal Boundary Description

This property is 10.4 miles long and is maintained as a frontage road by the State Highway Department. The east end lies at the junction of Route 66 with the Palomas interchange overpass road one hundred yards south of the interchange, and the west end is Hist.&Arch. at the cattleguard marking the entrance to the Montoya interchange at the west end of the village of Montoya. The sides are defined by a corridor extending fifty feet on either side of the centerline of the road, marking a right of way of 100 feet, a minimum width used by the State Highway Department during the 1930s.

Boundary Justification

The boundary includes the entire parcel historically associated with this section of Route 66.
