DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Grams Building is located in the heart of the old commercial area of Winona which is situated one block south of the old steamboat levee. The area is now severely deteriorated in some portions while undergoing clearance in others.

Designed in the burgeoning, early Italianate phase of architectural design, the building retains overtones of Gothic design, especially at the fenestration and should be properly classified as an example of "transitional" architecture. Despite some alteration to the front facade (i.e., the boarded windows and the loss of the carved cornice) the building should still be noted for its rare retention of the original, first-floor colonade. Surviving are the cast iron pilaster columns, many of the original doors and much of the original millwork. The limestone door and window sills at the foundation line are also intact.

The interior has been considerably altered over many years of differing use, but retains its original spatial arrangement. The structural condition, while in fair condition, is increasingly in need of attention as is the exterior brick work and ornamental detail.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built ca. 1868 as part of the old Second Street Commercial Club of Winona, the Grams Building is symbolic of the once common but now nearly extinct style of commercial architecture built in the upper Mississippi Valley after the Civil War. Transitional in style, the building is primarily early Italianate but with Gothic overtones. The latter can be recognized where the original window glazing has been retained. Although having suffered the use of its original iron or wood cornice trim, the building facade nevertheless has undergone surprisingly little alteration. This is especially true of the first floor, which despite having lost some of its original windows, has still not suffered the "modernization" of aluminum or plastic so common to the older commercial architecture of midwestern cities. This point alone architecturally separates the Grams Building from most of Winona's other commercial buildings. Also, noteworthy to the front facade is the retention of the cast iron Corinthian columns added to the building in the 1880s.

The Grams Building has served a varied and still not altogether known commercial history in the city of Winona. Its history can be traced to the early 1870s when part of the building contained a farm implement dealer, J. B. Kirch & Co. which remained its prime occupant until the late 1880s. In the mid-1890s, Latch & Son, the major wholesale and retail grocery house in the city became its occupant. Latch is probably its most historically significant occupant as it was the largest of a number of produce concerns generated by the rail and river traffic through The company built or occupied between 1866 and the 1930s a major portion of the Second Street commercial district and was its top commercial enterprise. Since 1933, the building has been primarily occupied by the Grams Feed and Seed Store and for which it is now known.

Various portions of the building have also held, during its colorful history, a saloon, a clothing store, a cigar manufacturer; a real estate office and a physician's office.
