

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The First Christian Church Education Building (1924) is a severe, Neo-Classical style structure faced with smooth ashlar and marble columns. It is L-shaped in plan, with the central block, originally used as the sanctuary, on the street, and a wing at the rear. The building is three stories high above a raised basement that serves as a podium. The third story of the central block, however, is only one room deep, with the roof beyond screened on the north and south sides by the exterior wall of the attic story. Current plans for rehabilitation are to enclose the open portion and make the entire third floor functional, as implied from the exterior. A wide flight of steps rises from the street to the main entrance, which is slightly recessed, with three double doors surmounted by large transoms, from which the Roman grillwork has been removed and above them three doublehung windows with large, single-light sashes. The entrance is framed by monumental paired pilasters and articulated in the central portion by engaged Tuscan columns, suggesting a modified in antis effect. Above them is a plain entablature with a broad, projecting cornice. The attic story echoes the motif below, with Tuscan paneled pilasters and single, doublehung windows. The pilasters support a cornice molding capped by a parapet. The ell at the rear of the main building continues the horizontal lines of the main facade and is pierced with sets of paired single-pane, double hung windows.

Much of the interior has been modified. Remaining features of note include the lobby, with its polished stone floor and hanging light fixtures of decorated glass (a few of the fixtures remain elsewhere in the building); the winding stained-oak hand rail and trim of the stairway in the northwest corner of the building; the pilasters and chair rails that remain in a few of the rooms; and the paneled parlor, a handsome space with suspended fivepart molded metal light fixtures and a free-standing column.

8. Significance



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The First Christian Church Education Building (1924) is important locally for the quality of its Neo-Classical style architecture and for its association with one of Birmingham's pioneer churches. Distinguished by the articulation and proportions of the entrance, the building exemplifies the restrained classicism and expanses of plain wall surface that typify the Neo-Classical style. It is one of only a handful of distinguished Neo-Classical structures dating from the 1920s in downtown Birmingham. It was designed by William Leslie Welton, a major local architect who studied at M.I.T. and the Ecole des Beaux Arts and later worked with McKim, Meade and White.

The church that laid the cornerstone for this building in 1924 was organized in 1874, only three years after the city was founded, making it one of Birmingham's pioneer congregations. After occupying several different sites along 21st Street, the church moved to its present site, then still on the fringes of the downtown residential district. This building was intended to be the education wing (the purpose for which it is now used), but the Depression delayed construction of the church sanctuary, and it served that purpose until the present one was built in 1954.

The building faces the Art Deco style Jefferson County Courthouse (1929-32), part of a complex of municipal and county buildings that surrounds Woodrow Wilson Park. Current plans are for the church to move to a suburban location and the First Christian Church Education Building to be rehabilitated for law offices.

Although a religious property, the building qualifies for the National Register because of the importance of its architecture and historical associations to downtown Birmingham and because of plans to rehabilitate the building for an appropriate non-religious use and retain its architectural character.
