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The F.J. Kirchman house is located in Wahoo, Saunders County, Nebraska. Wahoo is located about 40 miles due west of Omaha, and has a population of about 4,000 people (2000 census). The house was built in 1903 and is an example of the Queen Anne Style of the Late Victorian period. Covering three lots, the cross-gabled house stands prominently at the corner of 10th and Beech streets. The house, located at 957 N. Beech, is situated in a small neighborhood with wide tree lined streets.

The house is an irregularly shaped two and a half story wood frame structure. The clapboard siding, found only on the first floor, is replaced by wood shingles on the second and attic stories. The main entrance, on the east façade, has a one story asymmetrical porch, which wraps half way around the north elevation. The porch, supported by fluted Doric columns, contains a small pediment over the entryway. There is also a porch balustrade featuring spindlework ornamentation. This spindlework is continued above the entryway in a second story recessed balustrade. The gable of the main façade has a small overhang, above which are three small attic windows with diamond shaped panes, placed in a horizontal fashion.

A polygonal tower stands in the northeast corner of the house. Placed within the tower on the first floor are two double hung windows and one single pane window, all with diamond panes. The three tower windows in the second floor are also double hung with diamond panes. The tower's roof is a patterned wood shingle.

The north elevation has a full-height bay. The thick cut stone foundation is visible. The second story has a small recessed porch with a decorative balustrade that echoes the first story wraparound porch. The windows on the first and second stories are a mixture of one-over-one double hung, four-over-four double hung and a single paned window with diamond shaped muntins. The gabled end has the same fenestration as that of the primary façade- three small windows with diamond shaped panes. The rear elevation (west) is very simple with few windows. The three small attic windows do continue over to the rear elevation's gabled end.

The south elevation has a single door with a small overhang at the southwest corner. There is also a central bay the entire height of the house topped by an attic gable which has two diamond paned windows. The rest of the windows on the south side are a mixture of four-over-four, double hung and diamond paned.

The interior of the Kirchman house retains a high level of historic integrity. The oak wood floors are still intact throughout the house. A large wooden staircase with a prominent decorative newel post dominates the entryway. To the left of the entryway, on the south side of the house, is the parlor. The room, entered through double doors with beveled glass panes, has a large fireplace at the far end with the original fireplace surround of green tile. Several decorative leaded windows are original to the room. There are three beveled glass window lights, each with a different decorative pattern. The moldings, door frames and window frames are of a delicate egg-and-dart pattern. The doorframes on both the first and second stories have simple rosettes. Beyond the parlor is a small dining area and kitchen. The white and blue octagonal tiles of the kitchen floor are original. Oak was used in the front public areas, whereas pine, a softer wood, was used in the rear rooms.

The front staircase leads to a landing, five bedrooms and the bathroom. The bedrooms have the original plain wood moldings. At the head of the hallway is some carved fretwork with delicate spindles. The bathroom has the original fixtures installed by Kirchman in the 1920s.

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There is a one-story wood frame garage located in the southwest corner of the lot. The three-bay garage has a small gable over the central bay, mimicking the gable found over the front door of the house. This garage is considered to be a contributing building.

The only changes to the exterior of the house were initiated by the original owner, F.J. Kirchman. The front steps were originally cement, but Kirchman had them rebuilt of stone. He had a new roof put on the house in the mid 1920s. Overall, however, the F.J. Kirchman house retains a high level of historic architectural integrity and well represents the Queen Anne style.

The F.J. Kirchman house is locally significant under Criterion C as a well-preserved example of Queen Anne architecture, a style popular from approximately 1890 to 1910 in Nebraska. The house, always a single family home, exemplifies typical Queen Anne characteristics such as irregular wall planes achieved by architectural elements like bays, projections, insets, overhanging gables and a variety of wall materials. The building's significance is exhibited in its formulaic approach to the Queen Anne style, as well as its high level of historic integrity.

In 1903, F.J. Kirchman bought three lots in Wahoo, Saunders County, for \$2000 from W.W. Alt. The *Wahoo Wasp*, a local newspaper, noted that it was in a "very desirable location, and we understand that Mr. Kirchman will soon commence the erection of a modern house."¹ In April 1903, "work on the foundation of F.J. Kirchman's new house was commenced Tuesday. The plans were prepared by Jacob Ort, architect."² Ort, who worked regionally, designed the St. Vitus church in Touhy. By August the foundation was completed and the builders started

erecting the house. The *Wahoo Wasp* listed Johnson Crawford as the contractor, and went on to note that "when completed Mr. Kirchman will have one of the model residences of the city."³ In 1913, Kirchman's house was featured in the *Wasp* as one of the attractive and modern homes of Wahoo.⁴

Kirchman, a prominent banker, was a partner in half a dozen Saunders County banks, as well as a few in South Dakota. Kirchman and his banks prospered until 1930 when the Depression hit the Midwest. Townspeople rushed the banks to collect their savings and soon discovered money missing. In May 1930, at the age of 64, F.J. Kirchman was found responsible for the missing money. He was arrested at his home and sentenced to a 60-year penitentiary term and fined \$11,000.⁵

At this time, Kirchman sold his house to Ernest and Jacquline Schiefelbein. In a 1932 letter from Kirchman to Mr. Schiefelbein, written while in the state penitentiary, the former owner explained some alterations he made.⁶ The only bathroom in the house was remodeled in 1921, and the following year the downstairs rooms were remodeled, too. A few years before 1930, Kirchman put a new roof on the house for around \$650. The Schiefelbeins made no significant remodeling, keeping changes to only an addition of a shower and washbasin in the basement. The Schiefelbeins

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occupied the house until 1957 when they sold it to Bob Sullivan. In 1972 the house changed owners again, this time bought by Charles Ferguson. The current owners, Rob and Rachelle Hall, purchased the home in 1989.

In Saunders County, 17 Queen Anne houses have been surveyed, six of which are found in Wahoo⁷. Of the 17 Queen Anne houses, the F.J. Kirchman house is the most complete in terms of original Queen Anne architectural characteristics. For example, the house still has an asymmetrical porch with ornate spindlework, a combination of wall materials and a front facing gable. Also, there is a tower, a steeply pitched roof, bay windows and an overall irregular shape. These are all architectural features that identify it as a Late Victorian Queen Anne house.

The Queen Anne style was developed in the 1860s by Englishman Richard Norman Shaw. The term "Queen Anne" is a bit of a misnomer. The style was mainly influenced by late medieval architecture of the Queen Elizabeth era. In America, Henry Hobson Richardson made the style popular in the 1870s. A decade later, the Queen Anne style was featured in pattern books and the first architectural magazine, *The American Architect and Building News*. Queen Anne architecture quickly spread throughout the nation due to the ability to transport pre-cut architectural elements via the railways. However, popular architectural styles became dominant in Nebraska roughly a decade later that the rest of the country⁸.

The F.J. Kirchman house retains a high degree of its original fabric, which dates to 1903. Virtually intact, the house still exhibits its original Queen Anne style and identifying features, such as varying wall planes, a mixture of materials and an assortment of architectural components. The high level of historic integrity of the F.J. Kirchman house, as well as its established Queen Anne style, makes it eligible for listing under Criterion C in the National Register of Historic Places.
