who practiced most of his life in Fisherville. He died in 1870 but his widow owned the house for several years. are Reid graves in the graveyard in front of the house. The frame L-shaped addition does not appear on the 1879 Atlas of Jefferson County and it was probably added in the 1880s by John H. Gilliland who bought the house from Reid's widow. The Gillilands were prominent farmers and owned land in and around the village.

Significance

The main block of the Fisher house is an excellent example of a frame, vernacular farmhouse with Italianate and Eastlake-style trim. The house is the most substantial dwelling extant in Fisherville and it has, no doubt, been the most imposing house in the village since its construction in the 1880s. The rear wing, a two-story brick structure, predates the main block and was probably built ca. 1834 by Robert or John Fisher. The Fishers owned the Fisher mill (ca. 1834-1850) and all the land along the Louisville - Taylorsville Turnpike upon which the village of Fisherville flourished after 1850. Their importance in this area is evidenced by the fact that this house has always (according to local tradition) been known as "the Fisher house."

Boundary Description

The boundary of the Fisher house nomination is shown as a red line on the attached aerial photo. (SCALE: 1" = 200') The nominated site contains approximately 7500 sq. ft. and includes the house. There are no significant outbuildings.
