Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features:

This is a one-story brick building that is constructed in the PWA Moderne architectural style. It has a low-pitched, parapeted gable roof. Large low-relief pilasters with abstract, torch-like decorative capitals break up the side walls into vertical window panels. The stepped-back, geometric motif found at the top of the pilasters projects above the parapet and, when repeated at intervals down the length of the walls, gives the building a castellated appearance. The building remains in good condition and alterations to the original structure have been kept to a minimum. There is, however, a large c. 1965 concrete block shed addition on one end. This alteration, while clearly visible, does not significantly damage the historic integrity of the design. The Ferron High School Shop Building is identical to this one.

Statement of Historical Significance:

Construction Date: 1935-36

Built in 1935-36, the Castle Dale High School Shop is part of the Public Works Buildings Thematic Resources nomination and is significant because it helps document the impact of New Deal programs in Utah, which was one of the states that the Great Depression of the 1930s most severely affected. In 1933 Utah had an unemployment rate of 36 percent, the fourth highest in the country, and for the period 1932-1940 Utah's unemployment rate averaged 25 percent. Because the depression hit Utah so hard, federal programs were extensive in the state. Overall, per capita federal spending in Utah during the 1930s was 9th among the 48 states, and the percentage of workers on federal work projects was far above the national average. Building programs were of great importance. During the 1930s virtually every public building constructed in Utah, including county courthouses, city halls, fire stations, national guard armories, public school buildings, and a variety of others, were built under federal programs by one of several agencies, including the Civil Works Administration (CWA), the Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA), the National Youth Administration (NYA), the Works Progress Administration (WPA), or the Public Works Administration (PWA), and almost without exception none of the buildings would have been built when they were without the assistance of the federal government.

The Castle Dale High School Shop is one of 233 public works buildings identified in Utah that were built during the 1930s and early 1940s. Only 130 of the 233 buildings are known to remain today and retain their historic integrity. Of the 233, 107 were public school buildings; 55 of them remain. In Emery County a total of 6 buildings were constructed, 2 of which remain and retain their historic integrity. Of the 6 built, 3 were school buildings, and only one of those remains relatively unaltered.

The Castle Dale High School shop building was constructed in 1935 and 1936 along with 2 other shop buildings, one at the Ferron High School and another (See Continuation Sheet)

at the Huntington High School. The one at Ferron High School is significantly altered but still standing, while the one at Huntington High School has been demolished. The total cost for all three buildings was \$36,000. Construction on the 3 buildings began in the summer of 1935 and was completed in the spring of 1936. The contractors for the buildings were Talboe and Litchfield of Provo, Utah.
