DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Stockgrowers' Bank was constructed in 1903. Architecturally, it is basically Romanesque Revival in design as evidenced by the generally massive appearance of the building, the use of both arched and flat-topped windows, the corner tower with its polygonal roof, the columned entrance and the use of both brick and stone construction materials.

The two story structure rests upon a cut sandstone foundation and uses buff colored brick for its facing. Darker brick is used as a decorative element. The building's most outstanding feature is the polygonal corner tower. Important details of the structure include the outstanding decorative brickwork on both the Main Street and Deadwood Street facades, the interlocking corners of the tower, the arched windows with their brick keystones and the stamped or cast ornamental festons around the base of the tower's roof. Originally, cast iron cresting was used to fill the gaps between the tower and the brick parapets on both facades of the building. This cresting appears in the early photo of the bank that accompanies this form.

The entrances to the building were altered and moved during a remodeling that occurred in the late 1920's. This alteration gave the building a more classical flavor.

The window's surrounds have round arches, flat arches or just flat topped while lugsills appear on the first level. The second story's sills continue across the building as a string course. Some of the top portions of the windows have been painted, but all remain double hung. The main door was round headed but is now flat with two Doric columns.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Richardsoman

The Stockgrowers' Bank is significant as the single example of Romanesque Revival architecture in Fort Pierre. (While not outstanding by any national standard, it represents an interesting and well-executed adaptation of the style to the needs of a frontier community.) It is probably the most important commercial structure erected in Fort Pierre during the twentieth century. From an urban design point of view, the Stockgrowers' Bank is the most impressive landmark in the city. It completely dominates the center of town as it stands at the corner of Deadwood and Main.

BUILDER/ARCHITECT

Historically, the Stockgrowers' Bank symbolizes the commercial development of Fort Pierre during the early twentieth century as the business center for much of western South Dakota's cattle-raising activity. However, the location on which the bank is situated is perhaps the site of the first bank in western South Dakota.

In 1890, by Presidential Proclamation, the Indian Territory known as the Great Sioux Reserve was opened for settlement. Within days of this event Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Millett crossed the river at Pierre and settled in what is now Fort Pierre. Milletts, having established squatter's rights for their residence on April 26, 1890, officially incorporated a banking enterprise at the corner of Deadwood and Main - site of the subject building. The names of those who were investors and the first customers of that bank are gone, but the names of officers exist and are names synonymous with the development of western South Dakota. They include: Charles S. Millet, President; Reverend Thomas L. Riggs, Vice President; A.J. Banker, Director; Frank Fischer, Director; and Anton Fischer, Director.

In 1903 Charles Millett, in association with Gaylord E. Sumner and James (Scotty) Philip, built the subject building and began the Stockgrowers' Bank and a chain of associated banks in Midland, Philip, Kadoka, Cottonwood and Milesville.

Upon its completion in 1903 the Stockgrowers' Bank became the most prestigious office and commercial structure in the city. Besides the bank itself, other tenants included the Lynch Barber Shop, the Phillips, Young & McPherson Land Office, the first telephone exchange in Fort Pierre, Binder & Borst Hardware Store, Hargesheimer Drug Store, the Webb-Lambert Attorney's Office, and the offices of Doctors Lavery, Walsh and Morrissey.

Other locally prominent names associated with the Stockgrowers' Bank building are Anton and Frank Fischer, originators of what was the oldest general store under continuous management in central South Dakota; Gaylord Sumner, owner of the first lumber yard in Fort Pierre; Reverend Thomas L. Riggs, son of Reverend Stephen Return Riggs, founder of Oahe Mission; and finally, no introduction is needed for James (Scotty) Philip.
