Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Wilder House (1904) is a substantial story-and-a-half frame Queen Anne Revival cottage located near the center of the rural town of Chatham. Despite a few alterations, the house retains its National Register eligibility.

The Wilder House features a central hall plan, three rooms deep, with a small rear wing. Two of the rooms terminate in semihexagonal bays. The main roof of the house, which is more or less pyramidal, is enlivened by the use of five projecting gables, two of which are set asymmetrically in the front. The front also features a three-bay Eastlake gallery. Most of the single pane plate glass sash windows are mounted in pairs under a single cornice. The front door has three plate glass transoms and single pane side lights. The original Eastlake screen door survives as does the interior staircase.

The following changes have been made in the house since construction:


- (1) The interior wall surfaces have been covered in sheetrock.
- (2) All of the original mantels have been replaced.
- (3) The old rear porch has been replaced due to deterioration.

#### Assessment of Integrity:

Despite the above changes, the Wilder House retains its obvious identity as a Queen Anne cottage, owing to the previously described features. Moreover, its architectural significance is based upon the attributes mentioned in Item 8, all of which still survive. In any case, in the opinion of the State Historic Preservation Office, the Wilder House is eligible for the Register, despite the above few changes, because there is so little left of the historic patrimony of Jackson Parish.

The Wilder House is also being nominated in the area of exploration/settlement because of its association with the founding of the town of Chatham. It easily retains enough of its original appearance to represent this association.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph) Criteria A and C

The Wilder House is locally significant in the area of exploration/settlement because of its close association with the founding of the town of Chatham. It is also locally significant in the area of architecture as a superior example among the few surviving late-nineteenth/early-twentieth century residences in Jackson Parish.

#### **EXPLORATION/SETTLEMENT:**

The town of Chatham traces its beginnings to 1903, when the Tremont and Gulf Railroad began to continue their line from Eros on toward Womack. The company planned to establish a town somewhere in between. The initial choice was a small community called Dalley (or Veal Farm), which was apparently on a more direct line between Eros and Womack. The railroad officials called a meeting in Dalley to discuss the matter, and only two citizens attended, Dr. Samuel O. Wilder and Mr. E. W. Ramsey. Because of this apparent lack of interest, the railroad company decided to locate the town on land they owned about two miles east of Dalley. The town was named after Noah J. Chatham, a local farmer and early settler in the area.

The Wilder House was the first house erected in Chatham. The Tremont and Gulf Railroad officials were well acquainted with Dr. Wilder and desired his services as the railroad's doctor. Upon hearing that he was contemplating a move to Mer Rouge, they told him that if he would locate in what was to be Chatham, they would give him the lot of his choice. When the railroad surveyed the town, Dr. Wilder chose a corner lot and construction of the present house was begun in 1904. The town of Chatham then grew up around the Wilder House.

NB: The above is common knowledge in the town of Chatham and is based largely upon oral history. A taped interview with Herman Wilder, the son of Dr. Samuel O. Wilder, was used in compiling the above. Mr. Wilder was 12 in 1904 and 90 at the time of the interview.

#### ARCHITECTURE:

Over the years the rural piney woods parish of Jackson has lost almost all of its historic structures.\* This loss has been so complete that for almost a year the State Historic Preservation Office tried without success to find a Register worthy property. Of the handful of late-nineteenth/early-twentieth century residences which have been identified in the parish, the Wilder House is one of the finest. It has a central hall, which most of its fellows do not. It is a full three rooms deep, as opposed to the usual one or two, and it has a relatively elaborate roofline. Complexity of the roofscape was one of the hallmarks of the period and the Wilder House probably has more projecting gables than any other house in the parish. Moreover, the Wilder House has one of the
