DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Orlando W. Warner home is a two-story I-form adobe brick building, dating from the 1890's. The house was apparently constructed as a complete unit by Warner, although it has the appearance of a rectangular two-story structure with a large rear addition. The front of the building has three bays and a two-story, four column porch extending across the entire facade. The front section has medium gables with a partial cornice return. The two single stack end chimneys are corbelled and slightly recessed from the gable ends.

The rear section of the house has a broken gable roof, with a single stack brick chimney slightly recessed from the gable end, straddling the ridge. On the two sides of the rear section are recessed and contained two-story porches. The porches on the west side were enclosed about 1910 by owner John Peterson, son-in-law of the builder, Warner. Peterson's daughter, Mrs. Emma Walker, the current owner and occupant, added a sunroom and carport in the late 1950's and painted the adobe white.

The layout, and apparently the function, of the rooms is unchanged. The front section consists of a central hall with staircase, with a bedroom on either side, on both the first and second floors. Both floors of the rear section consist of one large room, with the side porches and four small rooms used for storage opening off of each of the large chambers. The upper chamber served as a parlor, the lower as kitchen, dining and living area.

The fruit warehouse is located approximately 150 yards north of the house. It is a one and one-half rectangular brick super structure constructed on a stone foundation of random rubble. The warehouse constructed c. 1910 was built on a side hill with a raised entrance. The vernacular building has a symmetrical facade with square window and door bays, wooden lintels and sills, a gabled roof with a plain cornice.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Orlando W. Warner House is significant as one of the oldest and best preserved pioneer homes in Moab. Its builder played a significant role in the agricultural development of the area through the promotion of a local fruit industry. The house and surrounding grounds was the site for many early community celebrations in commemoration of the 4th and 24th of July.

#### HISTORY

The Orlando W. Warner house was constructed c. 1890, ten years after its builder arrived in Moab. Born in Sepacuel, New York, in 1839, O. W. came to Utah with his family and settled in Fillmore in 1851. Capitalizing on the experience with his father and older brothers in operating saw mills in the Fillmore area, Orlando built first a saw mill and later a grist mill after his arrival in the Moab area. During the winter of 1881 he was awarded a contract to build a section of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad grade through Grand County. After moving his family to Moab in 1881, they lived first in a dugout then a log cabin until the present two-story adobe house was completed. The house and grounds were used for celebrations, especially Independence Day and the 24th of July, the date celebrating the arrival of the first Mormon pioneers in the Salt Lake Valley in 1847. A platform was constructed on top of the apple cellar and was used during the summer for community dances. Mr. Warner was a leader in the development of Moab's fruit industry. When he brought his family to Moab in 1881 he brought many fruit trees which he not only planted himself but distributed to other Moab settlers.

The Warner orchards produced apples, peaches, and pears. Grapes were also grown for wine with the leaves being used to feed silk worms. Under Warner's care the orchards prospered, but he became involved in a conflict with the Moab Irrigation Company over water rights. Despite the successful defense of his claim to 1/20th of the water in Mill Creek, Warner was burdened by a large sum owed in lawyers' fees, and in 1906 he sold the property to his son-in-law, John Peterson, and moved to Woods Cross, Utah.

Mr. Peterson maintained the orchards until they became unprofitable and he had the trees taken out and the orchards made into pasture land.

The house was allowed to deteriorate until 1945 when John Peterson invited his daughter, Mrs. Emma Walker, and her family to move into the house. Under Mrs. Walker's care, the house has been preserved, with only a few changes including the enclosure of the side porch on the west end to accommodate a kitchen, bathroom and washroom, and the addition of a sunroom to the back of the house.
