Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Serra Pharmacy is a two-storey, reinforced concrete structure located on a corner lot. Its particular location allowed the builder to chamfer the corner and situate the entrance prominently towards the intersection of two of Bayamón's primary streets. All of the door and window surrounds are quioned imparting a rusticated appearance to the otherwise The balconies strengthen the horizontality of the planar facades. Decorative brackets embellished with pendants and floral building. motifs support the coffered balcony slabs. These carry a heavily proportioned balustrade and banister. A dentil course wraps around the front edge of the balconies, mimicking the building's cornice above. entablure is composed of a stylized frieze and archirave to support the This in turn is surmounted by a low parapet wall. windows and doors have been replaced throughout the years. examples remain: one above the main entrance, the other at the final bay of the short facades's second floor. Fortunately, the remaining structure has suffered very little alterations.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Farmacia Serra (Serra Drugstore) was the first and perhaps the best example of early 20th century commercial-residential architecture in Bayamón's urban core. The architecture is the result of integrating the traditional urban commercial residential typology with new construction materials (reinforced concrete).

The use of concrete, instead of traditional brick and masonry, allowed the exhuberant ornamentation of the cornice, balconies, etc. at a lower cost. This prompted a proliferation or ornaments and the integration of various motifs from diverse architectural styles resulting in an ecclectic style which has received the name of "modernismo" or Romantic Ecclecticism. This architectural style prevailed in Puerto Rico until the late 1920's.

The construction of this building (1910) in one of the town's most prominent location, close to the plaza and along the main commercial through fare, served as an incentive for other business owners to build in the same fashion. Today only two of these structures remain, Farmacia Serra and el Palacio (also being nominated).



This building was constructed in 1910 to house Mr. Luis Serra's first drugstore. This was the first of a chain of drugstores which serves the Puerto Rican community. Mr. Serra and his family lived in the upper floor as was costumary in those days. He personally attended to the drugstore which became Bayamón's most important pharmaceutical supply house. His fame as one of the island's best druggist opened the way for the development of the Serra pharmacy chain.

Puerto Rico has several drugstore chains. The three most prominent are: Moscoso, Blanco and Serra. Each of these chains began as town drugstores, Moscoso in Aibonito, Blanco in San Juan and Serra in Bayamón. The prestige and quality of their products gained island-wide recognition allowing for the development of branches covering the entire island. Mr. Luis Serra was one of these professional entrepreneures who paved the way for the modern drugstore and the most important in his district.

Due to the building's location close to the Plaza, social clubs and the residence of the town's most prominent citizens, the drugstore became the meeting place for the town's politicians and intellectuals to discuss the latest events and decide what action could be taken. These kind of meetings (tertulias) continued to take place until the beginning of WW II when due to curfews they could no longer meet in public spaces.
