7. Description

Located less than one quarter of a mile from the Warren County line, the Crain Hill School and Church building still serves as a community meeting place for the residents of the small rural Van Buren County community of Crain Hill. This small, one room, vernacular building has suffered some alteration through the last few years; however, it retains its historical associations.

The Crain Hill School and Church building is a small, frame, weatherboarded, gable roofed, rectangular shaped vernacular building. The structure sits on a wooden pier—foundation covered with pressed metal. The major elevation faces east with the gable end facing Crain Hill Road. Decoration on this elevation is limited to gable returns and simple molding surrounding the main entry which is placed in the center of this elevation. A shed roofed porch with a concrete block deck and four simple square porch posts occurs across the east elevation. The north and south elevations are identically detailed with three one/one sash windows defining the three bays. The rear (west) elevation has no openings or detailing.

The interior of the Crain Hill School and Church building is also very simple. Flush boards of varied widths cover the ceiling and the walls. The simple benches date from around the turn of the century. A blackboard remains on the west wall. The windows have simple surrounds. The west end of the building is a dais with a wooden lectern and low railing with turned balusters. This was installed after the school moved out of the building in 1927.

Alterations to this building include the rearrangement of the main entry from two single leaf doors to one central double leaf door which occurred circa 1930, the new porch posts and deck, the tongue and groove flooring(applied over the earlier red cedar flooring), and the windows which were replaced in 1982. Despite these changes the Crain Hill School and Church building retains its historical associations.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Crain Hill School and Church is being nominated under National Register criterion A for its historical importance as the earliest remaining school and church building in the rural Van Buren County community of Crain Hill, Tennessee. This small, frame, one-room schoolhouse was built circa 1870 to serve the Rocky River Valley inhabitants as a school and place of worship. The structure was used as a schoolhouse until 1927 when a new larger building was constructed farther up the Rocky River Road but its function as a church continued until the mid-twentieth century. Today, the structure is maintained by the community and is used only for special occasions. The structure has undergone a few changes over the last few years; however, the Crain Hill School and Church building retains it historical integrity.

The Crain Hill School and Church building is the second structure for that purpose built on this site. The site, donated by Oliver Crain, sits at the top of a rise and overlooks the Rocky River and the Crain Hill Cemetery. Oliver Crain stipulated, in addition to providing facilities for a school, the structure would also be used as a church building for the community. This was fairly common in rural areas at this time for school buildings to serve both functions; however, it was further stipulated that the building was available to all religious groups with no preference indicated. The local people got together and built a small, one-room, frame structure which served the community until after the Civil War.

In the summer and fall of 1870 the new building was erected on the same site. The small, one room, gable roofed, two by three bay wide structure served the community as its only available school until 1927 when the Rosewell School was erected by the county farther south along Rocky Creek Road. The Crain Hill building continued to be used as a church building until the mid-twentieth century.

Two local clergymen were instrumental in having the building contructed, the Baptist preacher, Reverend Lawson Safely (1848-1931) and the Church of Christ minister, William R. Payne (1837-1921). Both of these men were buried across the street from the school and church building in the Crain Hill Cemetery. Other groups who also used the building for services included the Church of God, the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-Day Saints, as well as itinerant fundamentalist preachers.

Today the building is still cared for and maintained by residents and former residents of the Crain Hill community. The structure is used for funerals, weddings, and the annual community picnic. Alterations to the structure include the rearrangement of the entry, enclosure of the foundation in pressed metal the replacement of the porch deck, and the windows. Despite these changes, the Crain Hill School and Church retains its historical associations.
