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NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Davidson School, built circa 1910, is located in the remains of the community of Davidson. The one story, frame, weatherboarded school sits in close proximity to two of the approximate six houses that remain. The H-plan building sits on an sloping lot with little foundation exposed on the northwest end and a raised foundation on the southeast end.

The main, or southwest, facade is composed of two legs of the H-plan with a shed roof porch constructed between them. The legs of the school both have a gable end roof with returns. The northern end of the main facade contains three windows, while the southern end has four. The windows are boarded shut with hinged, flush board shutters. The integral porch sits on a dry laid stone foundation and the porch roof is supported by four square posts with two plain boards placed between the posts forming a railing. A small brick chimney is located at the valley between the shed roof of the porch and the northern gable. The main entrance of the school is a single leaf, wood panel door located at the center of the building. The entry is flanked by two windows on each side. Secondary, single leaf entrances are located on the interior side of the legs. The northwest door appears to be original, while the southeast door is a replacement.

The southeastern elevation of the school is composed primarily of a plain weatherboarded wall. Single windows, boarded shut, are located at the far northeastern and southwestern ends. Two single stack chimneys are located at the gable edge at the interior side of the windows. Two small crawl space entrances are located in the raised foundation along with a window opening on the northeastern end.

The northwestern elevation is composed of three windows located on the southwestern end and a single leaf, paneled door flanked by two windows on the northwestern end. The door appears to be a later addition, and may be located at the site of a former window. A detached round drum water tank on a raised metal platform, a non-contributing structure, is located near the center of this elevation.

The rear, or northeastern, elevation of the schoolhouse is similar to the front facade with four windows in the southeastern leg of the H and three windows in the northeastern leg. The rear porch area of the school has been enclosed at an undetermined date, but may have been added when the school was sold. The shed roof has exposed rafter ends and a chimney located at the intersection of the northeastern gable and the shed roof. Four unmatched window openings have been cut into the wall.

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A photograph taken by the State Board of Education in 1937 shows that the school has had only minor alterations. Originally the school had a square cupola located on the center gable, only two square posts supporting the porch, and a stone foundation on the northern end of the building and vertical boards on the southern end. All windows were six-over-six double hung sash. These windows are intact behind the current shutters.

The interior of the school has remained relatively unchanged over the years. Upon entering the center door of the school's front entrance, there is a large common room that retains its original floor, walls, ceilings. This room is located in the cross bar of the H-plan school. original walls, and ceilings of this room and the majority of the school building are narrow tongue and groove siding. The walls run horizontally and have a wainscot of vertical flush boards located below a chair rail. On the southwest wall of the room is the center entrance door flanked by two shuttered windows on each side. On northwest wall there is a single door, an open entrance as wide as two single leaf doors and a two other single leaf doors. The latter two doors are sealed shut. All doors and windows throughout the school are surrounded by simple mouldings. northeast wall of this common room, there were originally three windows. There are now two windows boarded over and the third window, on the easterly end, has been converted to a door. On the southeast side of the common room is a single leaf entrance that gives admittance to the rear of the stage on the northerly end and a single entrance to the auditorium on The 1983-84 Tennessee Survey Form indicates that the the southerly end. center portion of the school served as a gym.

On the northwest end of the school are two classrooms. The front classroom, the larger of the two rooms, remains relatively unaltered. The walls, ceiling and trim along with bulletin boards all remain as they were originally, however the floor is now a modern tile floor. On the northeastern wall of the classroom are two single leaf doors, one at each end. The space between the two doors shows evidence of something being removed. This is probably where the original blackboards were located.

The rear classroom has undergone some alterations with a lowered ceiling covered with wallboard panels covering the original ceiling. The original ceiling is visible under portions of the lowered ceiling that has failed. The walls, for the most part, remain as they were originally with the exception of two by fours that have been added to form room partitions. On the southwest wall at the northwest end the door between the two classrooms

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has been boarded over. This room appears to have served as a residence at one time.

The original back porch of the school has been enclosed and forms a hallway between the small classroom and the auditorium. The original rear doors and windows remain of the school remain on the southwestern wall. However the windows have been closed with old chalkboards (wood panels painted with black paint), possibly those missing from the large classroom. As stated earlier, the window on the southeast end has been converted to a door for entrance to the common room. The ceiling has been lowered and it, along with most of the walls, has been covered with wallboard.

The room on the southeastern part of the school is an auditorium. A stage with a semi-circular arched opening dominates the northwest wall. Entrance to the room is through single leaf doors that are located on the southeastern wall, providing entry from both the front and rear porches. A third entrance is located at the rear of the stage at the northeastern end of the common room. This auditorium retains its original features of floor, wall treatment and ceiling. As with the other rooms in the school the auditorium is missing its original light fixtures. The majority of the school interior retains a green and white paint scheme. Visible from the interior of the school are the original six over six windows.

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The Davidson School is significant under criterion A and C for its historical and architectural significance to the coal mining community of Davidson and Fentress County. The school meets the registration requirements as set forth in the Multiple Property Documentation Form for Historic and Architectural Resources of Fentress County.

Built circa 1910 to serve the children of the Highland Coal and Lumber Company workers, the school was probably constructed by the company for the county. The school, the only extant public use building in the community of Davidson, is an important resource reflecting the industrial history of the community. Davidson, which now consists of only a few scattered houses and the school, was established in 1900 and incorporated in 1934. In 1930 the population of the community was 250 and by 1934 was down to 140.

Photographic evidence in the <u>History of Education</u> shows that the school was in excellent condition in 1949 and may have still been in use. The school is an excellent example of the type of pattern book school built in Tennessee during the early part of the twentieth century although no plan has been found at this time. The Davidson School is the only building to retain integrity in the community and is an important resource illustrating the industrial and architectural history of the once vital coal camp of Davidson.

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
BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

The tax map for this nomination has the scale 1" = 400'. This scale tax map is prepared by the Tennessee State Board of Equalization for rural areas. In the past, the Tennessee Historical Commission has used this scale map for nominations and has found that the 1" = 400' adequately meets our office needs. The Tennessee Historical Commission does not have the facilities to prepare maps to the scale preferred by the National Park Service. To supplement this map, the nomination includes a detailed verbal boundary description.

The boundaries for Davidson School include all of parcel number 8 on Fentress Tax Maps #125 and #117.


The boundaries include the land historically associated with Davidson School
