STATE NATIONAL ATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: PHOTOS The Dials are an important Meridian family among the early settlers, and J. R. Dial, original owner of the house, operated the first cotton gin and saw mill after the Civil War. In 1872 J. R. Dial sold forty acres for a fairground to the East Mississippi Agricultural and Mechanical Association, at that time the only agricultural society in this part of the state. This fairgrounds became the site of the Meridian Fair and Exposition Association in 1890, which later (1908) deeded the land to the City, for creation of a park (Highland Park, entered on the National Register of Historic Places in 1979).

E. H. Dial was mayor of Meridian from 1893 until 1901. It was during his term that the city installed a sewerage system and began the first street paving. Dial was also a federal court clerk attorney. The present owner of the house, Kate Dial Sanford, is the daughter of E. H. Dial.

The Dial House is known locally as the oldest house in Meridian and is the only remaining example of this cottage type. E. H. Dial, former Meridian mayor, built the house in the 1870s. The Dial family has owned and lived in the house since its construction, and Mayor Dial's daughter and granddaughter still reside here.
