Exterior.

The Miller-Kingsland House was constructed at two different periods.

The West wing, built around 1740, is a 12 story structure with gable roof and a Dutch sweep on the South side. The West wall of this section is stone and brick providing for the large fireplace and Dutch oven. The rest of the wing is frame and was originally clapboard covered, but was covered over with abestos shingles aroun 1930.

The Main section, built in 1808, is a 2½ story Dutch style gambrel roof house with an offset center chimney. The Main house has 3 oays, the Eastern-most being a side hall which has a Victorian porch protecting the doorway. The South facade has knee-wall windows on the second floor. The East wall has a small applique chimney added for the furnace about 1875-1905. As with the older section the original clapboard exterior was covered about 1930 with building paper and 20 inch asbestos shingles,

Interior.

Much of the interior hardware and woodwork of the Miller-Kingsland Houses is original. The colonial has an enormous brownstone fireplace with a high narrow mantel and a Dutch oven. (See photo) Flanking the fireplace are wooden cupboards with the original hardware. This 15½! by 15½! room apparently was a complete house before 1808, when the main section was constructed. The floor boards are random width and the ceilings have open beams which appear expertly hand hewn.

The Main section, built in 1808, according to a plaque in one of the two Federal mantels, was built in 1808.

From the side hall one enters and immediately confronts the attractive stairway to the second floor. The hall is 19 feet by $8\frac{1}{2}$ feet. Behind the hall is a pantry or store room. Off to the side of the store room and hall is the bedroom and dining room, both 18 feet by $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet. The center chimney divides thes two rooms with large fireplaces. The walls are plaster and have chair rails. The floor boards are 6 to 12 inches wide. The doors are mostly original.

The upstairs follows basically the same plan as the ground floor, out there are no fireplaces in the upstairs.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Settlement.

The original house (the 1 story west wing) is the oldest known house in the town of Boonton. The land on which it stands, bordered on south by the Rockaway River, was purchased in 1728 by the first settler, Johannes Miller "...of Roughway River..." from John Reading, one of the proprietors of West New Jersey. A County road survey of 1758 for what is now Vreeland Avenue directed that a road be run down to Jonas Miller's.

Johannes Miller willed his property to his son, who subsequently sold the property to Isaac Kingsland in 1798.


Isaac Kingsland brought his first wife here to live in the onestory with attic house in that year. She bore him three chrildren, and died in 1805. Isaac married the second time to the widowed Nancy Heard in 1807, and built the main unit of the house the next year. The old wing was retained as a kitchen.

Architecture.

About the only negative aspect concerning the Miller-Kingsland House is the unfortunate application of asbestos shingles in the 1930's. Otherwise this house is an ideal blending of the old Dutch colonial one room early settlers house with the early 19th century main section which has both Federal characteristics and Dutch elements.
