is probably the oldest extant house in Lumpkin, Georgia. The original owner was Jared Irwin, one of the earliest settlers of Stewart County. He was born in Washington County, Georgia, on February 14, 1799. The was a nephew of Jared Irwin (1751-1818), Governor of Georgia from 1796 to 1798 and 1806-1809. Irwin came to the area, then part of Randolph County, and by 1830 was one of the largest land holders in the area. His home almost became the first official meeting place of the Inferior Court of Randolph County, he was one of the original county commissioners, and was Trustee of the Poor (CONTD)



STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecture: Considered the oldest house in Lumpkin, this house is architecturally significant because it is the only known log structure remaining in town. It also shows the evolution of style in that it today represents a bungalow house of a much later date than the original building construction. Exploration/Settlement: This house is significant as the earliest extent home in Lumpkin, representing Lumpkin's first recorded history. Its owner was one of the leaders in the settlement of Lumpkin and helped establish the county government and educational systems.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION (II): around lawn; situated in residential neighborhood with Horton House (#7) to the north, and c. 1970 housing to east and west, with open field to rear.

DATES OF ALTERATIONS (III): building was stylistically updated to resemble the popular bungalow style.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE (III): School Fund. He was killed in June 1836 at the Battle of Shepard's Plantation, while the Lower Creek Indians were trying to reclaim the newly formed Stewart County. His widow lived in the house until her death in 1887. It then became the property of her daughter and son-in-law. Late in the century they sold it to Robert Humber, who shortly thereafter sold it to the present owners, the Partains. They remodeled the house to its present appearance in the early 20th century. Jared Irwin's great, great grandaughter, Mrs. Bill Westbrook is still a resident of Lumpkin.
