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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Battle of Bushy Run, fought in 1763, just 1 1/2 miles north of present day Jeanette, Pennsylvania, was a decisive English victory in the most determined and dangerous Indian attack on the Colonial frontier in the 18th century. Often called "Pontiac's Conspiracy," or "Rebellion," the frontier forts fell one by one, and within a few weeks, along a thousand miles of frontier, only Forts Bedford, Ligonier, and Pitt held out in Pennsylvania, as did Fort Niagra in the north, and Fort Detroit to the west.

Here, Colonel Henry Bouquet, dispatched to relieve the beseiged Fort Pitt, confronted the Indian forces. Under sustained attack, Bouquet reversed the tide of battle by a strategic ruse. Feigning retreat and drawing the Indians in disorganized pursuit, he turned and attacked their flank, putting them to flight. In raising the seige of Fort Pitt Bouquet demonstrated an understanding of wilderness warfare which enabled him to pacify the Ohio frontier.

The battlefield site at Bushy Rum is contained today within Bushy Rum Battlefield State Park, a recreational park, wherein the historic woodlands setting has been only slightly altered.

History

In order to reopen communication with the West, Sir Jeffrey Amherst, the British commander-in-chief, ordered Colonel Henry Bouquet to muster all available troops and march to the relief of Fort Pitt. Bouquet, as second in command under General Forbes in his 1758 expedition against French Fort Duquesne, had gained valuable experience in wilderness warfare. He set out from Carlisle on July 18, 1763, with a force of about 500 soldiers and a long and cumbersome train of supply wagons and packhorses, to make the grueling 200 mile march. It took a week to reach Fort Bedford, and by the time they reached Fort Ligonier on August 2, the Colonel was becoming increasingly concerned by the lack of news from Fort Pitt. To speed up his march, he left the wagons and most of his supplies at Ligonier when he resumed his advance on August 4.

When the Indians learned of the expedition, they determined to repeat their successes against Braddock in 1755 and Grant in 1758. Leaving their four day siege of Fort Pitt, the Indian forces set upon Bouquet's vanguard at Bushy Run, twenty-five miles east of Fort Pitt, on the afternoon of

August 5. Heavy fighting raged until nightfall, when the Colonel had his men strengthen their hilltop position by piling flour bags to form a redoubt. On the following day the Indians renewed the fighting with several fierce assaults on the "flour bag fort". Under this sustained attack, Bouquet countered with the strategic order to feign retreat. As the Indians rushed upon the camp, the Colonial troops turned, attacked the Indians on their flank, and put them to flight.

This two day battle raised the siege of Fort Pitt and clearly demonstrated Bouquet's understanding of the tactics of wilderness warfare. The following year Bouquet's expedition into central Ohio supressed further uprising and thus made the western frontier comparitively safe for the settlers who were soon to follow.
