Narrative Description

Summary

Trail Park is a triangular parcel (0.44 acres) at the intersection of North 400 Road and East 1700 Road located on the north edge of Baldwin City, Douglas County, in eastern Kansas (Figure 1). The park features a granite marker that is sited along a portion of North 400 Road that has been in use since its creation as part of the Santa Fe Trail. Along with the road segment, remnants of the trail are visible in private fields beginning about two-thirds of a mile to the northwest of the marker. This marker is an example of a Memorial and Marker property type, as defined in the *Historic Resources of the Santa Fe Trail* revised multiple property nomination.

Elaboration

Landscape Context

The Santa Fe Trail enters Douglas County at its extreme southeast corner, east of Baldwin City. As it enters the county from the east, the trail is generally oriented toward the west, but it turns to the northwest as it nears Baldwin City. The portion of the trail that is now North 400 Road is angled to the northwest, but the trail generally continued in a westward direction paralleling US-56 Highway. The trail crossed into northeastern Osage County near Overbrook (Figure 2).

Baldwin City is located in southeastern Douglas County approximately 15 miles south of Lawrence, the county seat. Baldwin City has a population of approximately 4,500 and is in a rural area that is experiencing suburban development. South of Trail Park is a new neighborhood called Firetree Estates. Across East 1700 Road to the east is a newer church and subdivision of residences. East 1700 Road is a paved north-south road that passes through the center of Baldwin City less than one-half mile to the south; it becomes North 6th street at this point. North 400 Road is a gravel county road that intersects with East 1700 Road in a northwesterly direction. North 400 Road turns east approximately two-thirds of a mile northwest of the park. Remnants of the trail are visible in the private fields north of where the gravel road turns.

Trail Park

There is a small creek that clips the northwest corner of the park's property boundary. Trees along the creek denote its path. The small park includes three signs/markers and no other built features. There is a 1907 DAR Marker made of stone (contributing), a metal commemorative sign erected in 1983 by two alumni of Baker University (class of 1932) (non-contributing), and a late 20th century wood sign erected by the local Santa Fe Trail Historical Society that identifies the park (non-contributing).

The DAR monument is located very near the junction of North 400 Road and East 1700 Road (Figure 3). The marker is approximately four feet tall and is a red granite boulder with a marble plaque that sits atop a concrete base. The granite portion has an inscription that reads ERECTED BY THE LAWRENCE AND / OTTAWA CHAPTERS DAUGHTERS / OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION / 1907. The marble plaque was replaced in 1968 or 1969 when the original bronze face was stolen. The original 26"x19" bronze face was a pattern used on several special markers, including one in Penn Valley Park in Kansas City, Missouri, after which this marble replacement is patterned.¹ The marble portion has an inscription that reads THIS MARKS THE ROUTE OF THE / SANTA FE TRAIL / KANSAS CITY TO SANTA FE 1822-1880.

Period of Significance (justification)

The period of significance encompasses the year Trail Park was established and the marker was placed.

Criteria Considerations (justification)

As discussed in the revised multiple property nomination, the park and commemorative DAR marker is eligible because the age, intent, and symbolic value of this resource contribute to the park and marker's own historical significance. This significance is in large-part directly tied to the effort to memorialize the trail by those who were associated with the trail. This object is located along a county road that was the Santa Fe Trail, and in this way helps to confirm and illuminate the history of the trail itself.

Narrative Statement of Significance

Summary

Trail Park is significant on a statewide level for its association with the commemoration of the Santa Fe Trail through Douglas County, Kansas. The park was created in 1907 when local chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) placed a commemorative marker at the site, which sits along a segment of the Santa Fe Trail still utilized as a county road. These commemorative activities were part of a broader effort by the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution from 1906 to 1914 to document sites along the trail. This property is nominated as part of the *Historic Resources of the Santa Fe Trail* revised MPS under Criterion A in the area of social history. This site materially reflects important historic events outlined in the historic context Commemoration and Reuse of the Santa Fe Trail, 1880-1987.

Elaboration

Santa Fe Trail through Douglas County

The Santa Fe Trail enters Douglas County at its extreme southeast corner east of Baldwin City. As it enters the county from the east, the trail is generally oriented toward the west, but it turns in to the northwest as it nears Baldwin City. Maps of this area produced as early as 1857 indicate that this small portion of the trail north of Baldwin City was incorporated into the local road network early in the county's history. J. Cooper Stuck's 1857 map, which pre-dates the founding of Baldwin City, lists this as the road to Westport, Missouri (Figure 4). F.W. Beers' maps of Palmyra Township published in 1873 and 1909 show this road as a rare angled thoroughfare in an otherwise gridded road pattern (Figures 5 & 6). This 1909 map records the owner of this property as I. Stickel (sometimes spelled Stickle), who donated the land for Trail Park.

The DAR and Trail Park

The Kansas Society DAR was a rather new organization when it undertook this major project to document and mark the Santa Fe Trail in Kansas. Two local chapters partnered to erect the Trail Park monument: the General Edward Hand chapter of Ottawa and Betty Washington chapter of Lawrence. These two chapters were among the first to organize in Kansas. The Lawrence chapter organized in 1896 and Ottawa followed in 1899.

The Kansas Society DAR worked with local chapters, governments, school children, and interested citizens to place 93 granite markers along the 500-mile trail route in Kansas from 1906 to 1914. Eighty-nine markers follow the basic wording pattern: SANTA FE TRAIL / 1822 – 1872 / MARKED BY THE / DAUGHTERS OF THE / AMERICAN / REVOLUTION / AND THE / STATE OF KANSAS / 1906. Four special markers were erected, each differing in scale or design from the 89 smaller granite markers. These special markers were erected at Baldwin City (Trail Park), Burlingame (Fannie Geiger Thompson Memorial), Lost Spring (Eunice Sterling Chapter), and Lyons (Sterling Chapter).² The text of the Trail Park marker reads ERECTED BY THE LAWRENCE AND / OTTAWA CHAPTERS DAUGHTERS / OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION / 1907 and THIS MARKS THE ROUTE OF THE / SANTA FE TRAIL / KANSAS CITY TO SANTA FE 1822-1880. The DAR erected seven markers in Douglas County. These sites included (from east to west) Black Jack, Palmyra, Trail Park, Brooklyn, Willow Springs, Globe, and Flag Springs/Simmons Point Stage Station, all of which are extant.³ Of the seven, this was the only was erected with a bronze face.

In 1907, Civil War veteran Isaiah Stickle (1830-1911) and his wife Jennie donated to Baker University this small half-acre parcel along the trail route to commemorate the Santa Fe Trail.⁴ The *Baldwin Republican* described this parcel as “a tongue of land having a connection to the original trail itself...because no where else is the old Trail used as a public highway.”⁵ At least nowhere in the vicinity had the trail path itself been converted to a public roadway.

As was the case with many DAR markers, local school children contributed to the fundraising efforts to erect the monument at Trail Park. It is not clear how much money the Baldwin City students raised, but they paid for the installation of the marker’s foundation.⁶ This, too, was part of a broader effort by Kansas Society DAR to stimulate interest in the Santa Fe Trail project. According to DAR historian Almira Cordry, the Kansas Society DAR sent correspondence to all public school superintendents asking each student to donate a penny toward the effort of erecting markers along the Santa Fe Trail. Teachers were asked to encourage their students to write essays on local history topics for prizes.⁷

The Ottawa and Lawrence chapters organized the placing and unveiling of the marker. The monument was erected several days prior to the official unveiling, which took place on October 11, 1907 at the Methodist Church. Speakers included George W. Martin, Secretary of the Kansas State Historical Society, and Ottawa resident Grace Meeker, Secretary of the Kansas Society DAR. Following the program, a procession walked from the church to the monument where it was officially unveiled by Mrs. Charles Seewir of Lawrence.⁸ Mrs. Seewir, Regent of the Betty Washington Chapter, was on the Press Committee for the Kansas Society DAR during its efforts to mark the trail.⁹

When the marker was unveiled, it had a bronze plaque depicting a romanticized wagon caravan (Figure 7). This plaque was designed by Maude Miles, who was an art teacher in the Manual Training School in Kansas City. The Kansas City, Missouri boards of Park Commissioners and Public Works paid Mrs. Miles \$400 for the design.¹⁰ The plaque was installed on four granite markers in the Kansas City area, including one in Penn Valley Park (Figure 8); they were dedicated in 1906.¹¹ The marking of the trail in Kansas City was initiated in May 1905 when the City of Kansas City’s Board of Public Works invited a group of trail freighters to tour the city and locate the route of the trail.¹²

As the Kansas Society DAR began finalizing its plans for the Kansas markers, a Topeka Daughter, Mrs. J.K. Hudson, suggested that the Board of Park Commissioners share the design with the Kansas Society DAR.¹³ At \$30 each, the Society suggested the plaques might be best used for special markers.¹⁴ Besides the cost – almost double what was paid for the other DAR state markers – the artistic depiction of the caravan was criticized by the DAR, as well as by Santa Fe Trail alumni.¹⁵

The original bronze plaque on the marker was stolen in 1967 and replaced with a marble replica. The original bronze face served as a pattern for the marble replacement now adorning the face. The local Santa Fe Trail Historical Society of South Douglas County installed the new marble plaque in 1968 or 1969.¹⁶

Baker University has retained ownership of the property since 1907, and it remains open to the public.








Trail Park.






MARKER AT BALDWIN.




