Summary Paragraph

The William H. Grey Gravesite consists of a seven tiered sandstone obelisk in the southern end of the Magnolia Cemetery. Decorations on the stone are limited to the East side. The East side is engraved with various symbols, many of masonic origin, as well as important dates in his life and a poem written in his honor.

Narrative Description

The very top tier on the East side hosts a 5-pointed star, representing the Biblical Star of the East that guided the Magi to Bethlehem. Below the star is the Masonic square and compass. The second tier reads:

W. H. GREY. BORN IN WASHINGTON D.C. DEC. 22, 1829. DIED IN HELENA. ARK. NOV. 8. 1888.

The third tier of the obelisk is engraved with an anchor, used by Masons as a symbol of well-grounded hope. The fourth tier from the top is engraved with the most symbols. Present on this stone are two pillars, representing strength and establishment and sometimes used as a reference of the Temple of Solomon (Masonic Lodges are referred to as "Temples" in reference to the Temple of Solomon). On the far left of this tier is a bell representing a call to worship. On the far right is a ladder, known as Jacob's ladder, the rungs represent the guiding virtues of freemasonry. In the middle, between the two pillars, is an open book, representing the Book of Life, with the Masonic square and compass engraved on its pages. Engraved on the top left of the tier is the sun, with the moon and stars engraved on the far right. These images combined are used by the freemasons to represent God, whom the sun, moon and stars obey. Directly between the sun and the moon and stars is an eye with rays of light, this is a common Masonic symbol that represents the all-seeing God. The fifth tier from the top holds the most writing, it reads:

The sixth tier is the last tier with any engraving, it holds a poem that reads:

"Up all the "illegible" graded steps.

From Life obscure to Fame
Thous't studied, toiled, prayed and fought
To leave thy race a name -

A name in legislature hall.
And high official station.
The highest in the mystic craft.
Worthy of emulation."

Following the poem is a note on the origin of the monument:

ERECTED TO THE MEMORY OF W. H. GREY BY THE MASONS OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS

The bottom tier has no engravings and was left rough on all four faces.

Integrity

The William H. Grey Gravesite has decent integrity. The monument is somewhat weathered and there is lichen growing on the stone in places. The top tier has twisted slightly and has a chipped edge on the East side. The third tier has a crack on the West corner. The fourth tier has a chipped edge on the East side and a chipped corner on the West side. The foundation is somewhat deteriorated, exposing brick used in the foundation of the monument. The area surrounding the monument remains a cemetery, as it has been since 1899.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph

SUMMARY

The gravesite of William H. Grey, located in Magnolia Cemetery, Helena – West Helena, Phillips County, Arkansas, is the only surviving property in Arkansas associated with his life. Grey was a leader in the black community during the period of Reconstruction. He was a minister, a Masonic leader, and a prominent member of the Republican Party in Arkansas. Especially renowned for his oratory skills, he was the first black politician to address a national convention. As such, the property is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under **Criterion B** with **statewide significance**. The property is eligible for inclusion under **Criteria Consideration C: as a grave of a historical figure of outstanding importance**.

Narrative Statement of Significance

ELABORATION

William H. Grey was born a free man in Washington, D.C., on December 22, 1829. The identity of his parents is unknown. However, census records list him as "mulatto," indicating that one of his parents, most likely his father, was white. While in Washington, D.C., Grey attended a "pay school" founded by John F. Cook. ¹ He also worked as a servant for politician and future Virginia governor, Henry A. Wise. Wise was known as a gifted orator and allowed Grey to attend sessions of Congress where it is likely Grey learned the parliamentary process of debate. ²

Sometime around 1840 Grey's family moved from Washington, D.C., to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and then on to Cincinnati, Ohio. In 1852 his mother and stepfather passed away during a cholera epidemic. Grey became a minister and moved to St. Louis, Missouri, where he took up work as a

cook on steamboats traveling the Ohio and Mississippi rivers. ³ In 1854, he married Henrietta Winslow of Louisiana. Their first child was born in 1856 and they would go on to have 7 more children together.⁴

By 1863 the family had relocated to Helena, Arkansas, where Grey established a grocery and bakery with business partners, Oliver Winslow and H. B. Robinson.⁵ Though he was a business owner, records indicate that Grey owned no property. 6 In 1865 the Convention of Colored Citizens of the State of Arkansas held a meeting in Little Rock to discuss the future welfare of blacks in Arkansas. This convention was the catalyst to Grey's political career and formed his reputation as a skilled orator capable of great pathos. In 1867 Grey was one of four delegates chosen to the constitutional convention from his constituency. Alongside the seven other black delegates, Grey defended the Radical Republican platform and worked to promote the rights of the freedmen. He emerged as the leader among the black delegates, serving on four standing committees and taking the floor twenty-five times to oppose pro-Confederate Democrats. He pioneered a resolution establishing federal aid for the poor and allowing freed slaves to homestead government lands. 8

On January 13, 1868, Grey countered a Democratic measure to reinstate the Constitution of 1864 that would effectively disenfranchise Black Arkansans. He asserted that blacks had earned their citizenship with their sacrifices on the battlefields. He declared:

"[t]he right of franchise is due the Negroes bought by the blood of forty thousand of their race shed in three wars.... The government has made a solemn covenant with the Negro to vest him with the right of franchise if he would throw his weight in the balance in favor of the Union and bare his breast to the storm of bullets; and I am convinced that it would not go back on itself . . . Give us the franchise, and if we do not exercise it properly, you have the numbers to take it away from us. It would be impossible for the Negro to get justice in a State whereof he was not a full citizen.... Justice should be like the Egyptian statue, 'blind and recognizing no color'."10

The convention voted largely against the Democratic measure, thereby blocking the reinstatement of the 1864 constitution and securing nearly all male citizens the right to vote and hold office. On July 6, 1869, Grey was admitted to practice of law but no records indicate he ever practiced as an attorney¹¹ Grey remained involved in state politics following the 1868 convention and was elected to the state legislature in 1869. In 1870 he was appointed as the First Circuit Court clerk and ex-Officio Recorder of Deeds. 12 In 1872 Grey attended the Republican National Convention as a delegate. By seconding the nomination of President Ulysses S. Grant, he became the first African American to address a national presidential

nominating convention. Appointed by Republican Governor Elisha Baxter, Grey served as the Commissioner of Immigration and State Lands from 1872 to 1874. ¹³

Outside of politics, Grey had joined the Masons when he lived in Cincinnati and when the Grand Lodge of Arkansas was established in 1873, he was named the First Grand Master. ¹⁴ Later that same year Grey suffered what is believed to be a stroke while in New York to oversee arrangements for Arkansas's exhibit at the 1873 World's Fair in Vienna. This setback forced him to return to Arkansas. ¹⁵ Grey continued to be involved in government, filling a vacancy in the state senate in 1875 and serving as the Phillips County Probate and County Court clerk until 1878, when Democrats regained control. ¹⁶ In September of 1878 Grey suffered another apparent stroke. From this he never recovered and died in Helena, November 8, 1888. ¹⁷

Today, William H. Grey's tombstone, erected in his honor by the Masons of Arkansas, is the only surviving property known to exist in Helena that is associated with the life of this influential Republican politician. Although the Old State House in Little Rock still stands, it only represents a small part of William H. Grey's life and significance.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

William H. Grey was a key figure in the black community of Helena, Arkansas, during the turbulent times of Reconstruction following the Civil War. He was a minister, Mason, lawyer, businessman and politician. He was an eloquent speaker who used his gift to fight for rights for the freedmen at the Constitutional Convention of 1868. He became a lawyer in 1869 and that same year was elected to the Arkansas State Legislature. In 1870 he was appointed the First Circuit Court clerk and ex-Officio Recorder of Deeds. In 1872, as a delegate to the Republican National Convention, he made history by being the first African American to address a national presidential nominating convention. From 1872 – 1874 he served as the Commissioner of Immigration and State Lands. In 1873 he helped establish the Grand Lodge of Arkansas and became its first Grand Master. In addition, he was chosen to oversee Arkansas's exhibit for the 1873 World's Fair in Vienna. He served in the State Senate in 1875 and finally as Phillips County Probate and County Court clerk until 1878. For its association with his life and legacy, the William H. Grey gravesite is being nominated to the National Register with **statewide significance** under **Criterion B**.



Listing of this property provides recognition of the community's historic importance and assures protective review of the federal projects that might adversely affect the character of the historic property.

Listing in the National Register does not mean that limitations will be placed on the property by the federal government. Public visitation rights are not required of property owners. The federal government will not attach covenants to the property or seek to acquire it.
