Description

The George Hidden House was constructed in 1896. The architect is unknown. The building is constructed in the Colonial Revival architectural style with Queen Anne Cottage influences and represents the Builder's Plan Book property type. It retains a high degree of integrity of design, materials, and workmanship. The George Hidden House is presently utilized as offices.

The George Hidden House is located in Block 2, Lot 16-18 of Brill's Addition. Brill's Addition was originally platted in 1887. The building faces north onto East Moreland Street. The streetscape along East Moreland Street is characterized by modest. working class residences. No outbuildings are located on the site. The site is developed with a contemporary concrete drive and parking area.

The George Hidden House is a square, one-story building of brick construction. The building measures approximately 30 x 30 feet. The steeply pitched truncated hip roof features gable dormers and is covered with wood shingles. It has a stone foundation.

Exterior features include a shed roofed veranda with turned wood posts. Wood double hung, one over one lite windows are located discretely along the side walls. Two opposing fixed lite wood sash windows are located at the facade. The window openings feature segmental arches. Important architectural elements include elaborate jig-cut and turned spindle wood details at the principal dormer and at the porch. The gable walls also feature decorative shingles and round arch ventilators. Brick corbelling exists below the boxed comice eaves and at the chimneys.

Alterations include a rear addition and the replacement of some windows.

Statement of Significance

The George Hidden House is significant under Criteria C under the area of significance of Architecture. It is representative of the historic context "Residential Architecture in Phoenix Prior to 1901." Constructed in 1896 in the Colonial Revival architectural style, the George Hidden House is representative of the Builder's Plan Book property type. It is a unique and well crafted example of its property type. The George Hidden House is also important in the area of Community Planning. As one of only three nineteenth century buildings remaining in Brill's Addition which was originally platted in 1887, the George Hidden House represents the historic context "Nineteenth Century Community Development in Phoenix."

A popular architectural style used during the plan book era was the Colonial Revival style. The use of the style in residential architecture was wide spread in the late nineteenth century. Closely followed copies of plan book examples of the style, as demonstrated by the George Hidden House, were once common. The Hidden House, with its extensive detailing and workmanship, is a rare survivor of its type. The house illustrates a local interpretation of the plan book designs that resulted in an elaborately detailed building which incorporates the major stylistic concepts of Colonial architecture. With the exception of the replacement of some window sash and a modest rear addition, the Colonial Revival inspired design of the George

Statement of Significance (Continued)

Hidden House remains intact. Stylistic features include the typical overall attention to symmetry, accentuated at the facade and reinforced by the square plan, boxy massing, and truncated hip roof. Dominant elements include gabled dormers at each roof plane, detailed with wood shingles, lattice work and spindle work, and the typical facade length veranda, also detailed with turned wood decoration. The round arch vestibule entry with recessed paired doors provide a unique stylistic focus to the symmetrical facade.
