The American Legion Hut is a one-story, T-shaped cypress log building with a truss roof constructed in 1933 at the corner of Hoover Street and Jackson Avenue in Hampton, South Carolina. The Hut was constructed as, and continues to be, a meeting hall for the Hampton American Legion Post 108 as well as serving as a site for civic and social events. Local workers built the Hut supported by funds from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, a federal agency that provided loans for work relief projects during the Great Depression.

The exterior walls of the building were constructed of saddle-notched cypress logs with a white mortar chinking and rests on a brick pier foundation. The hip roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The exposed rafters are of pine and are twenty-four inches on center. The roof sheathing is squared edge pine in various sizes including 1"x6", 1"x8", and 1"x10". The three-quarter width front porch deck is supported by brick piers, cypress log plates and sleepers, and features round solid wood columns supporting a hipped roof. Leading to the porch and building entrance are brick steps with brick and cast stone pedestal walls and a pipe hand rail down the middle. The entrance consists of double-leaf five-panel wood doors, and is flanked by two six-over-six light, double hung wood windows. Most other windows are either paired or tripartite six-over-six light, double-hung sash, with an occasional short pair or single. Framing all windows and extending to the foundation level are vertically-placed half-round logs simply applied over the log wall construction. An additional halfround log has been applied under the center of each paired window, which creates a look of underpanels. A large brick chimney with a brick corbel coping course rises along the northeast slope of the building's rear ell at its intersection with the main block. A brick chimney flue intersects the same roof slope nearer the rear of the ell. A small historic brick extension, laid in American bond, is located at the intersection of the main block and rear ell along the southwest elevation. A single-leaf, horizontal-paneled wood door with masonry steps is at the center of the rear ell's terminal wall.

On the interior, the floor is made up of 1"x4" tongue-and-groove oak boards. The floor rests on 10"x10" pine girders with 2"x8" pine floor joists 24" on center and 1"x12" square edged pine diagonal subflooring. All interior walls in the building are exposed cypress logs with the chinking revealed. The assembly room features a brick fireplace along its rear wall and a log truss ceiling. At its peak, the ceiling is eighteen feet above the floor. The dining hall ceiling is exposed to the roof system as well. The kitchen and restrooms have a pine beaded board ceilings. All interior doors are wood and contain five horizontal panels.

Minimal alterations to the building include a small brick room on the south side, lattice panels between the brick foundation piers, a window air conditioning unit, gas heat in the dining hall, lights on either side of the front entrance, and a central air conditioning unit in the assembly room.

The American Legion Hut is a log building constructed in 1933 at the southwest corner of the intersection of Hoover Street and Jackson Avenue in Hampton, South Carolina. The building is eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C for its architecture which was designed and constructed by American Legion Post 108 members and relief workers assisted by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC). The cypress logs used in constructing the Hut were harvested locally and prepared for construction by Jim Polk and Jim Barnes, local carpenters who were experienced in log construction. J. E. Fennell organized the labor for the local relief council.

The RFC was signed into law in January 1932 by President Herbert Hoover. The RFC was intended to help rejuvenate the depressed economy by providing loans from the federal treasury to banks, railroads, credit unions and mortgage companies. With the national economy still struggling, Hoover signed the Emergency Relief and Construction Act in July 1932 which provided millions of dollars in RFC relief loans to the states. In the southern states, these funds were often used for family assistance programs to initiate small work relief projects. In February 1933, South Carolina received an RFC loan totaling \$2,101,015. These funds were distributed to the counties and Hampton County received an allocation of \$38,000.

In April 1933, the American Legion post in Hampton County announced plans to build a log cabin as a recreation center and clubhouse for its organization. Construction began on May 8, 1933, and the hut was formally opened to the public on August 2, 1933. Labor to construct the cabin was supplied by the Hampton County relief council which paid for the labor with RFC funds. Four lots comprising approximately one acre of land for the building was given to the Town of Hampton by Senator George Warren. The Town deeded the land to Post 108 in 1940.

Vaney Bowers and his brother Dee Bowers, both of Hampton County, cut and skinned the cypress logs used to build the cabin. They pulled the logs on mule-driven carts to the construction site. The brothers were paid \$30 by Homer Hiers who coordinated work projects with the local relief council.⁴

The American Legion Hut in Hampton has served continuously as a meeting place not only for Legion members, but also for community functions such as school dances, town festivals, family reunions, and veterans' remembrance services.



This nomination is amended to remove Criterion C, for architecture, and substitute Criterion A, for social history. The narrative documents the important role of the RFC, a New Deal Depression-relief agency, in the construction of the building. There is insufficient context to justify architectural significance for the log construction.

This amendment has been confirmed with the South Carolina SHPO.
