The Martin House (c. 1879) is a late vernacular interpretation of the Greek Revival style. The one and one-half story cottage is located in rural farming country near Columbia in Caldwell Parish along a road with several other houses. The home has undergone relatively little change since its construction, and its National Register eligibility remains intact.

The house consists of a main block and a rear kitchen/dining ell. The main block contains four rooms, two on either side of a central hall with a steep staircase. Two additional rooms and a narrow hallway are tucked beneath the eaves of the gabled roof. The home's vernacular Greek Revival features include:

- 1) front and rear entrances outlined by transoms and sidelights with wooden panels below the glass. The transoms and sidelights frame double doors.
- 2) mock shoulder molding surrounding door and window openings. This "molding" is formed by extending the lintels outward beyond the edge of the beaded vertical members of the surrounds, and
- 3) four simple mantels, one found in each of the downstairs rooms. Each identical mantel has molded pilasters rising from tall beveled bases which support a wide entablature. This entablature is separated from the mantel shelf by a wide band of molding.

The two-room kitchen and dining wing stands a few feet behind the main house. Its gallery extends to form a breezeway which connects with the rear entrance of the home. An interesting feature of the ell's gallery is its roof and accompanying supports. The gallery is integrated beneath the mass of the wing's gabled roof and is supported by slender posts. However, an additional shed roof extends outward from the roof's edge, somewhat in the manner of a false gallery. This feature is supported by diagonal braces rising from the edge of the gallery floor. Shelves are attached to the posts and braces at the level where a railing would ordinarily be found.

Other features of interest in the home include wide interior baseboards, chamfered columns with molded capitals supporting a gable roof front porch on the main block, and matching engaged chamfered columns framing the main block's front and rear entrances. The house also has six-over-six windows and, with one exception, four panel doors. That one exception is a plank door which connects the two rooms of the rear wing.

Few alterations have occurred to the Martin House over the years. Changes worth noting are as follows:

- 1) the possible addition of closets beside two of the fireplaces in the main block. The exact date of these closets is uncertain. Although their doors and surrounds exactly match those found in the rest of the house, the inclusion of closets as an original feature in a house of this type and date would have been somewhat unusual.
- 2) the installation of beaded board on the home's ceilings and walls, and
- 3) a current restoration which has accomplished the following:
 - a) the replacement of rotten wood in several places. These locations include patches of siding and interior flooring, the area of the rear gallery floor connecting to the rear entrance, part of the rear entrance's door surround, and the entire front porch floor and balustrade. Although the new balustrade replicates the original, the accompanying newel posts are conjectural.
 - b) the installation of a small bathroom next to the fireplace in the rear ell, and
 - c) the removal and reinstallment of the home's four mantels, which caused a misalignment of the pieces with the walls. As a result, the brick behind the mantels is now visible along the mantels' edges.

These alterations are minor in terms of the National Register eligibility of the house. Except for the conjectural newel posts on the front porch and the deterioration which accompanies a vacant building, the Martin House looks exactly as it did when constructed. The beaded board walls and ceilings are themselves a historic alteration. As one of the oldest surviving structures in Caldwell Parish, the Martin House is a viable candidate for National Register listing.

Contributing Elements

Also standing on the property are three board and batten dependencies with metal roofs. These structures appear to be contemporary with the house and, thus, are being counted as contributing elements for the purposes of this nomination.

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The Martin House is locally significant in the area of architecture within Caldwell Parish because, as one of Caldwell's oldest surviving structures, it is a local landmark.

The area which would become Caldwell Parish was settled, first by a small number of Frenchmen and later by Anglo-American pioneers, well before the parish was officially created in 1838. Eventually migrants from Mississippi, Georgia, Alabama, Virginia, and North and South Carolina contributed their building traditions to the architectural patrimony of the parish. These settlers would have built houses like they knew in their home states, including many Upland South log dogtrots and galleried cottages with Greek Revival styling. However, very little remains to illustrate the parish's nineteenth century architectural heritage. The Historic Structures Inventory for Caldwell Parish documents only 261 buildings of at least 50 years of age in the entire parish. The overwhelming majority of these were built in the first three decades of the twentieth century. With the exception of two landmark commercial structures, one landmark church, and a dozen Queen Anne Revival style houses, all of these twentieth century structures are unstyled and undistinguished. The Martin House is a landmark within Caldwell Parish because, with its vernacular late Greek Revival styling, it is one of only four surviving houses which stylistically pre-date the Queen Anne.

Historical Note

The property where the Martin House is located was originally part of Minden Hall Plantation, which was owned by Samuel B. Fluitt. In 1879 Fluitt's five children drew lots for the property. George Martin, a Caldwell Parish cotton merchant and seed buyer, drew for his wife, Ann Fluitt Martin. The Martins took possession of a plot of 248 1/2 acres which was appraised at \$1,900. George and Ann lived in a log cabin (now destroyed) at the rear of the property while the kitchen and dining wing was being built, then lived in the newly completed structure while the main block of the house was under construction. The house is presently being restored by the Louisiana Art & Folk Festival, Inc. for use as a museum.


