The Ashland Farm house, designed by W. T. Downing of Atlanta, is an example of early 20th century neo-classical revival.

Built in 1905, the main house is situated on a hill in the midst of wooded and pasture land. This two story brick house has a portico with 12 fluted Corinthian columns that surround a central projecting section. The heavy, continuous entablature with dentils and guttae was originally topped by a balustrade; later the balustrade was removed. The portico ceiling is designed in a panelled, coffered pattern. The St. Louis-made, rust colored brick used in this construction has a hard-fired, dull ceramic quality. This non-porous brick, together with the careful placing of brick and mortar on the same plan, produce an extremely smooth exterior surface.

The sixteen bays of windows across the front facade are of two different types. The second story windows, two-over-two, are merely framed without elaboration. The first floor openings are also simple, but have a heavy entablature above and panelling beneath the glazed area. The lights are divided two-over-two but with smaller, transom-like lights on top of two vertical glass panels. All glazed areas that open on to the portico are double doors with a single lighted transom above. The main entrance has double doors and is emphasized directly above by a balustraded balcony with heavy brackets. The entrance steps are made of stone, as is the basement level.

In plan, upon entering the front door, there is a large central hallway with a drawing room, library, bedroom and cross hall on the left and a dining room, kitchen, and sun room on the right. Numerous bedrooms are on the second floor. At the end of the large first floor hallway is a Palladian window, flanked below on either side with stairs leading to the second and basement levels. The sun room windows have transom lights set with art nouveau designs of three burning candles and the lower more vertical panes are made of bevelled, heavy leaded glass. The mantel in this sun room has a beige marble facing with a solid mahogany shelf supported by gargoyle-like brackets, with this face-like motif repeated in a flat design under the shelf. Downing it designed a suite of furniture for the sun room in keeping with its design.

On the grounds surrounding the house are several dependencies and gardens. There are two brick servants' cottages, a barn, mill, gas house, and an open wagon shelter for a Conestoga wagon. The simple one story servants' cottages have hip roofs and four- column porches. These are reminiscent of the hotels on the range of Jefferson's University of Virginia. The barn is laid in American bonded, hand pressed brick from the walls of an old house that stood nearby. The pitch of the barn's hip roof is low and the lower level windows are arched and larger than the simple loft windows. The mill, its exterior only, was designed by Malcom Chishom in 1929; the interior was moved from Peeler Mill on Peavine Creek near Ringgold. There is also a gas house, later used as a smoke house, which stored the gas used for the lighting of the other houses on the place.

#### 7. Description, Ashland Farm

The original landscaping was designed and carried out by the Biltmore Nurseries of the Vanderbilt Estate near Asheville, North Carolina. The deciduous shrubs, such as forsythia and spirea, were massed around the main house, between the servants' cottage and along the driveways, but almost none of this type planting remains today. The grounds now include a formal boxwood garden, a sunken garden with pool, and extensive natural growth.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Ashland Farm, built in 1905 is an example of the late 19th and early 20th century neo-classical revival that was architecturally expressive of the great, new commercial wealths and the modern interpretations of traditional styles.

The original owner and builder, Z Cartter Patten, was a veteran of the Civil War, one time owner and publisher of the Chattanooga Times, founder of the Chattanooga Medicine Company, builder of the Hotel Patten in Chattanooga and founder of the Volunteer State Life Insurance Company.

Ashland Farm reflects some of the modern approaches to traditional styles. The eighteen room main house and the four dependencies were built at a cost well over \$76,000. It has the Jeffersonian character of brick facades, white columned porticos and balustrades; there is also the Jeffersonian or Palladian simplicity with horizontal orientation, smooth, unpretentious wall surfaces and ornmanents, and hilltop siting; yet it is more than a literal translation of traditional styles. The architect, W.T. Downing of Atlanta, injected into this "traditional" country gentry formula a modern quality. The spatial freedom, perhaps an influence of the preceding Victorian era, or the more modern idea of form follows function, is exemplified in the expanding plan and the increased number of windows. It is this quality of openness that is synthesized with the severity of classical form and detail and thus produces a twentieth century structure.

Much of the original landscaping at Ashland was carried out by the Biltmore Nurseries from the Vanderbilt Estate near Asheville, North Carolina. Although little of the original plantings remain, it is significant that the nurseries, responsible for the multi-thousand acre Vanderbilt Estate of gardens and forests, were involved at Ashland Farms.

The architect for Ashland Farms was Walter T. Downing, FAIA, of Atlanta. Other than Ashland Farms, Downing designed Hotel Patten in Chattanooga, numerous Atlanta residences and the Fine Arts Building at the Cotton States Exposition. Many of Downing's Atlanta homes found in his book, Domestic Architecture, 1897, have Victorian planned designs with well-defined classical details; however, several structures, such as the Fine Arts Building, did approach a more "total" classical format such as that found at Ashland Farms.
