

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:	NAME: Thomas Isaac Keys House
The one-and-one-half story wood frame house is raised on brick piers and is covered with a front gable roof. The facade gable is pierced by paired eight-over-eight double-hung windows flanked by narrower four-over-four windows. A three bay projecting porch extends across the full width of the facade. The pierced segmental-arched frieze of the porch is supported by paired columns resting on single brick piers. The main entrance is framed by the narrow center porch bay. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: The Thomas Isaac Keys House is historically signifi- cant as the home of the first black postmaster of Ocean Springs. Keys, a merchant, was a staunch Republican and was first appointed in 1889 during the administeration of Benjamin Harrison. He subsequently served during the McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt and Taft administrations. The last quarter of the nineteenth century was a period of cooperation between the pre- dominantly white Democratic Party and black Republicans in Mississippi. In exchange for black concessions on local and state levels, white Democratic representatives in Washington directed Federal patronage towards blacks during Republican administrations. (Willie D. Halsell, "Republican Factionalism in Mississippi, 1882 - 1884." Journal of Southern History, vol VII, No. 1, February 1941.) Keys' tenure as postmaster ended in 1911. He remained politically active, however, serving as a delegate to the Republican National Convention in Cleveland, Ohio in 1924.(continued)	PHOTOS


