The Camp operated from 1861 until 1863. The 3,000-man unit popularly known as "Phillips Legion" (officially known as the Fourth Brigade of Georgia Volunteers) trained here, and the infamous Andrew's Raid began at its gates. The Camp, along with the nearby railroad depot and hotel, were destroyed by Union troops in 1864.


