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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Lakewood Memorial Chapel, constructed in 1908-10, is located on the grounds of Lakewood Cemetery. The Cemetery is situated between two major Minneapolis lakes, Calhoun and Harriet, in the southwest section of the city.

The Byzantine style chapel was designed by prominent Minneapolis architect Harry Wild Jones, who patterned the building after Hagia Sophia, constructed in 537 AD, in Constantinople.

The one storey building follows a modified cruciform plan with a large center dome. Square towers with smaller domed caps delineate each of the building's corners. The main entrance is located in an outer narthex and a secondary entrance is sheltered by a porte cochere on the north side of the chapel. The walls of the building are constructed of red St. Cloud granite and the dome and roofs are sheathed in Spanish roll tile.

Special exterior features include a band of arched windows filled with stained glass which light the central dome, other stained glass windows and elaborate double entry doors with Moorish design overlay and stained glass transom. The doors are of solid bronze and other doors, window frames and sash are of copper.

The chapel interior is filled with Byzantine mosaics above a marble wainscoating. Skilled artisans, who had recently completed work on the Vatican in Rome, were imported to undertake the painstaking job of setting the estimated 3,000,000 pieces of mosaic. The mosaic was made in Venice, placed on gummed cloth and then transported to Lakewood where the workmen spent nearly three years setting it into place.

The chapel dome contains figures of the heavenly host, symbolic of the departing spirit, which were chosen for their non-sectarian character. The angel figures each hold a staff of flowers with those figures, at the four principal compass points, holding red roses, giving directional orientation to the chapel interior. Below the dome is a cornice formed of Teco pottery with the inscription, "Until the Day Breaks and the Shadows Flee Away," inlaid with gold mosaic. Below the cornice, set into lower arch spandrels, are circular mosaic insets of seated female figures each clothed in different garb.

Other ceiling areas within the chapel including inner narthex, aspe and anterooms, all have mosaic set in geometric designs.

At the time of its completion, the Lakewood Memorial Chapel was the only building in the United States with a mosaic interior. The building is unaltered, and is in excellent condition.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Lakewood Memorial Chapel is significant as an excellent architectural example of the Byzantine style whose mosaic chapel interior is unmatched in quality in any other Minnesota building. The chapel was designed by locally prominent architect Harry Wild Jones as a mortuary chapel and crematorium for Lakewood Cemetery. Jones patterned the chapel design after Hagia Sophia (537 AD) in Constantinople. Construction of the chapel began in 1908 using St. Cloud Granite for exterior walls and Spanish roll tile for the dome and other roofs. The mosiac chapel interior, completed in 1910, required the skill of trained artisans imported from Venice to set the estimated 3,000,000 mosaics above the marble wainscoating. The mosaics were made in Venice and placed on gummed cloth before being transported to Lakewood. The total cost of the building exceeded \$150,000.00, and at the time of its completion was the only building in America having a mosiac interior. Recent attempts to insure the building have been unsuccessful due to uncertainty about whether artisans are still available, at any expense, who could duplicate the original mosaics. Lakewood Memorial Chapel is the most elaborate example of Byzantine Mosaic art known in Minnesota and may be one of the finest of its type to be found anywhere in the United States.

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The boundaries for the Lakewood Memorial Chapel are as follows: From a point where the extension of Hennepin Avenue intersects the southern curb line of the drive in front of the cemetery Administration Building, and proceeding southwesterly along said curb line approximately 250 feet to point of beginning, then continuing southwest along said curb line in a southwesterly direction across both chapel drives, and curving to the southeast along said curb line to the point of land between and across from sections 11 and 14, then continuing along said curb line and curving to the northeast approximately 330 feet, and then from this point due northwest to point of beginning.
