Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The George Washburn House of Calais, Maine, dating from 1855, is an excellent example of the Gothic Revival style in a vernacular residential context.

The l_2 -story house is of frame construction, with gable roof, two internal brick chimneys, clapboard siding, and granite foundation.

The facade, which faces southwest, is three bays wide with a central entrance. This entrance, dating from the turn of this century, is of colonial revival form, with a single panelled door flanked by sidelights and surmounted by a fan. The bays to each side of the doorway each consist of paired 2/2 windows with elaboratelycarved projecting lintels. Fenestration throughout the rest of the house is paired 1/1 with the same distinctive lintels as on the facade.

At the half-story level of the facade are a pair of gabled dormers with elaborate barge-boards and finials. Between these, forming the central bay is a gabled projection containing a doorway which provides access to small balustraded balcony at the second-floor level. This projection carries ornate detail equivalent to them on the flanking dormer.

A one story porch, added at the rear in 1947, was enclosed as a den in 1962.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This house is one of a group of three distinctive Gothic Revival residences built side by side over a two year period by different owners. One, the Alexander Gilmore House, is already listed on the National Register and the third has been so altered as to render it ineligible for nomination. No explanation has been found for this grouping of stylistically similar and urbane structures in what was in the mid-19th century a fairly primitive mill town.

George Washburn, like Gilmore, was evidently a successful local businessman and it appears likely that he, together with his brother Charles who built the third house, joined with Gilmore in the purchase of this choice piece of property on what was then the outskirts of Calais high on the bank overlooking the St. Croix and Canada on the other shore.

Whatever the reason, these houses reflect an originality and sophistication unusual for their time and place.
