IV.SIGNIFICANCE	STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecture: This house is a good example of the architectural turning point in late 1890's architecture in Columbus; its porch represents the neo-classical style, while the remainder is a very conservative interpretation of the Victorian Gothic period. Local History: This house is significant as it was the home of Joseph Harrison, a salesman of shoes and boots, from 1896-1900. Also, this was the home of Carleton B. Gibson, who was superintendent of Columbus' public schools and who was largely responsible for the founding of Columbus' Industrial High School (in 1906) the first of its kind in the United States.
