DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Union Block and Montandon Buildings are both two-story commercial buildings with rusticated sandstone facades. The Romanesque Revival styled Union Block is distinguished by an arcaded second story window with a clerestory capped by a stepped parapet. A denticulated cornice leads to the parapet with its centered, truncated chevron proclaiming "Union Block." The building is symmetrical and five bays wide. The two eastern most bays have been covered by perforated aluminum panels; the original facade is preserved beneath these panels.

The Montandon Building was erected in 1908.

This Renaissance revival structure is distinguished by smooth stone Doric pilasters, and a higher cornice and parapet also of smooth stone. It has three bays on Idaho Street and seven bays on Eighth Street. Each bay contains 3 double hung sash windows with smooth stone flat arches with drip stones. The extreme east bay originally was a one story brick. In 1908 a sandstone veneer and second story was added. It is in a commercial style with two double hung sash windows with rusticated sandstone flat arches above them. The bay terminates with a rusticated sandstone cornice and parapet.

The first stories of all these buildings have been altered to accomodate present day retail purposes. The sole reminder of the original facade is the Union block's stone round arched entry to the upper story. There have been no additions.

Fidelity-Union Block

The Fidelity-Union block is significant in part for its continuation of the Romanesque motif on Idaho Street. It is a rather late rendering of the style and more maintains the spirit of the style than displays any precise design features. Its ponderous massing, use of local sandstone (as already described in the original significance), quasi-medeival parapet and flattened round arched windows all contribute to the structure's ability to evoke the Romanesque essence.

By perpetuating this stylistic spirit the Union block was much in keeping with its surrounding structures. On the south side of Idaho street once stood the impressive Rhenish Romanesque Boise City Hall building, unfortunately this was destroyed in the fifties in the name of progress and a completely ugly aluminum and glass, plastic looking excretion now occupies the site. Fortunately, the Boise City National Bank, certainly the city's, if not the state's finest example of Romanesque revival architecture as applied to a commercial structure, still stands diagonally across the intersection from the Fidelity building.

A such the building is an integral focal point on Idaho Street. Presently it is endangered by a rather insensative"progress" oriented redevelopment program.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Fidelity-Union Block is significant as a good local example of commercial buildings rendered in sandstone. The stone for both these buildings was quarried locally at Tablerock. This quarry's reputation was nationally known with a Yale University building and much of downtown Portland employing it in their construction. Several downtown Boise buildings use it, including the Capitol, the Emmanuel Lutheran Church, St. Michael's Episcopal Church, Eastman Building, and Boise City National Bank.

This block is a prominant part of the downtown streetscape and the Union block is especially noteworthy with its unique second story window and parapet design.

The Union block was built for a syndicate composed of some of turn of the century Boise's most prominent personalities: Mayor Moses Alexander, Fort Boise Commandant General Green, sheepman Robert Noble, wholesaler Jerry Lusk and Charles A. Clark. The first story accomodated five storjes while the second story contained offices and Christensen's dance hall.
