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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The boundaries of the Eli Whitney Gun Factory Site have been drawn intentionally broad to encompass the perimeters of the factory and to provide protection for artifacts which may be discovered during later investigations. The boundary commences at a point (A) on the east side of Whitney Avenue opposite the south line of Armory Street, then proceeds west along the south line of Armory Street a distance of 225' to point (B). The boundary then proceeds south at right angles a distance of 275' to point (C), then east at right angles a distance of 775' to point (D). The boundary proceeds north at right angles a distance of 550' to point (E), then west at right angles across the head of Lake Whitney a distance of 575' to point (F), then at right angles to (A), the point of beginning.

There are ten major buildings and foundations on the Eli Mhitney Gun Factory Site. Three buildings and two foundations directly relate to Eli Mhitney's occupation. Other buildings were erected after the closing of the gun works. Although most of the twenty-building Mhitney factory has been destroyed, there is much remaining evidence of the factory plan, and there is a great potential for archaeological investigation.<sup>1</sup> The Eli Mhitney Gun Factory occupied approximately six acres of land on a tract bisected by Whitney Avenue. The site is about two-miles north of the New Haven green(business center) and is situated in a valley formed by the Mill River. East Rock, a high promontory to the east, overlooks the site.

The three original Whitney buildings include a "single-men's boarding house"(ca. 1800), at the southwest corner of Whitney Avenue and Armory Street, a frame "factory barm"(1816) to the south, and a stone "earpentry -shop"(ca. 1800) across the Fill River from Whitney Avenue. In addition to the standing Whitney buildings, the fieldstone foundations of Whitney's forge(ca. 1800)remain between the carpentry shop and the river. The foundation of another Whitney buildings has been incorporated into the fabric of a frame office building built in 1888 by a later occupant. The foundation of the main assembly building(ca. 1800)has been excavated from under the rubble of a later brick factory, since destroyed. Other Whitney foundations will no doubt be located during the archaeological investigations to commence in 1974.

The single-men's boarding house is a rectangular-plan, two-story, frame house set upon a foundation of cut-stone. The asphalt-shingled, medium-pitch gable roof is oriented perpendicularly to the main facade. The main facade is four bays wide, with main access contained in the south end bay. Fenestration is double-hung sash type throughout, and dates from the late 19th-century. However, two attic windows in the

1. Elements of the original races and bridge supports also remain. Archaeological investigation in the spring of 1972 indicated that there is a variety of evidence intact below the two-foot level at the site of the assembly and finishing buildings.

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There are three structures on the site which do not relate to the period of occupation by Eli Mhitney's gun factory. The Winchester office building, a frame structure built in 1828, was erected on a portion of a fieldstone foundation of one of Mhitney's original shops. A second non-conforming building is the brick factory of Heany Industries, built about 1890. A third is the cinder-block "turbine-house" (ca. 1955) which is situated upon the site of Whitney's original turbine house. It is not recommended, however, that these buildings be removed during the investigative or interpretive phases of the development of the Whitney factory site.

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## The Eli Whitney Gun Factory Site is the location of a firearms works established in 1798 by Eli Whitney(1765-1825) at which he introduced a manufacturing concept which came to be known as the "American System of Manufacturing". Whitney's concept involved a systematic specialization of each function of production within the factory, and the manufacture of standardized, mass-produced goods. As such, Whitney is credited as one of the first manufacturers to replace skilled craftsmen with specialized power machines. Although much of the Whitney buildings have been destroyed, there are a significant number of artifacts "in-situ", as demonstrated by a series of test-digs conducted in 1972. Yale University intends to sponsor a major historical-archaeology project in 1974 which will be followed by the stabalization of the ruins and the erection of interpretive devices. The New Haven Colony Historical Society and the Historic American Engineering Record are cooperating.

Although Whitney's authorship of the concept of mass-production has been questioned, it is certain that Whitney articulated the "American system" at least ten years before the idea was proposed by any other American manufacturer. Whitney's original contract terminated in 1809, but production of firearms continued at the site into the 19thcentury. In 1860, the original Whitney assembly works was destroyed and a larger factory building erected on the site. The 1860 building has subsequently been removed, facilitating the investigation of the remains of Whitney's original factory. In the late 19th-century, the Whitney property was purchased by the Winchester Arms conglonerate which continued to use some of Whitney's facilities for the production of firearms, Winchester sold a portion of the property for other industrial uses, and, most recently, the New Haven Water Company has acquired the site because of its interest in the dam containing Lake Whitney.
