Exterior: This imposing three-story brick building with attic was built about 1898-1899 as an office building, with load-bearing brick walls. The design of the Cleveland Law Range is far more sophisticated than that of contemporary buildings in the area. The pattern is established with the use of five arched bays on the ground floor of the front elevation with rhythmic fenestration repeating the bay arrangement on the second and third floors. Although face brick is used only on the front, the design pattern continues on all elevations with the Dutch gable treatment of the two ends. The rear elevation had three dormers in the attic, and at the front there are two. One large centered dormer repeats the Dutch gable motif. All three gables incorporate the chimneys into the design. The materials of the building are well handled - brick walls, granite sills, belt courses, and slate roof. The brick is worked into patterns in the arches and belt courses and at the eaves is corbeled. The architectur of this structure is an example of Richardsonian Romanesque.

<u>Interior</u>: Each office was provided with a fireplace originally as there was no central heating system. There is one large central stairwell. Ceilings are approximately 14 feet on each of the three floors with attic ceiling height unknown.

Surroundings: Located across Magnolia Street from the County Courthouse, which is the second courthouse on that site. The previous courthouse was built there in 1892. The proximity of the Cleveland Law Range to the courthouse accounts for the large number of attorney offices which are located within this building. The Federal Building is across Walnut Streer to the north. Only part of the first floor is now used for offices due to deteriorating conditions.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE	·		

The Cleveland Law Range, located in Spartanburg, is one of the few remaining examples of Richardsonian Romanesque architecture in the South. This building has been used as offices for men of both national and statewide significance.

Architecture: Dr. Harold Cooledge, Architectural Historian of Clemson University, evaluates Cleveland Law Range "the single most distinguished building of downtown Spartanburg. Its possibilities, in adaptive usage, are also the highest. Because of location, isolation, association with local history, etc. it could be a center and focus of material history.... It could have multi-functions of value to the City - archives, historical, museum, preservation center, etc. I realize its adaption would take money, but it is such a distinguished building I think it would be worth the effort."

Dr. Cooledge, in a speech concerning Richardsonian Romanesque architecture, of which the Cleveland Law Range is an example, states: "Most of the---Southern examples of this period have been obliterated. They were rare to begin with; Richardson's period of greatest influence came when the South had very little money to spare for good architecture. Then our sectional bias for what is mistakenly called 'Colonial' has--until recently made post-bellum architecture a blind spot for the majority of conservationists."

Political: Three governors of South Carolina are counted among the prominent lawyers, judges and members of Congress who have maintained offices in the Cleveland Law Range. The most famous occupant was James F. Byrnes who served as member of Congress, U. S. Senator from South Carolina, Secretary of State under President Harry S. Truman, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, Director of War Mobilization and Reconversion under Franklin D. Roosevelt, and Governor of South Carolina, 1951-1955. Other occupants included John Gary Evans, Governor of South Carolina, 1895-1896; Sam Nichols, member of Congress, 1915-1921; C. C. Wyche, Federal District Judge; and Donald Russell, President of University of South Carolina, Governor of South Carolina 1963-1965, U. S. Senator, Federal District Judge, currently serving as a judge on the U. S. Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals.
