DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Henry C. Peak House is located in Warsaw, a small Ohio River community, in Gallatin County, Kentucky. The structure faces east and sits on Highway 35, approximately 2 1/2 blocks from the main town square.

Built in 1869, this structure is basically Gothic Revival with a few Greek tendancies. This is evidenced by the general massing and the pilastered facade and corners. The other main features on the facade include: five openings with wooden lintels and sills and 6/6 panes in the windows. The foundation is of rough cut stone and the brick pattern is common bond. All four gables boast a round arched window opening with the exception of the facade which has a door above the porch. It is thought that this was originally a window, also.¹ The present portico is of recent construction but is thought to be similar to the original one (see photo 1). It is simple with square posts and bracketed eaves. The main door surround is also unadorned with plain pilasters and a transom but no sidelights (see photo 2).

One unique feature of the structure is the split-flue chimneys. One chimney stack at the crest of each gable end splits to support two fireplaces. The window openings are located between the flues (see photos 3-4).

The kitchen block to the rear of the main structure was originally separate with an interior end chimney. A recent addition enclosed the dogtrot between the two and a 20th century porch was constructed in the angle of the ell (see photo 5).

The interior incorporates a central hall, double pile plan, original wood trim of interest and includes seven inch baseboards and chair railing throughout. Ornate plaster medallions grace the ceilings of most of the rooms (see photos 6-7). The mantlepieces are similar with round-arched openings, modified colonnettes bow-front shelf, panelled spandrels and a cartouche element. Also contained is an ornate iron grate and richly colored ceramic tiles that lend variety to the overall mantle element (see photos 8-9).

A vertical boarded barn is the only outbuilding extant. It has a projecting dormer, with barge boarding along the eaves (see photo 10).

The nomination includes the main house, a frame barn and the rectangular lot on which they sit.

¹The previous porch was larger and the window was probably lengthened to provide access to the upper porch.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Henry C. Peak House is an example of the Gothic Revival style, embodying the cross-axis plan which appears to be unique to the Gallatin County area. Built in 1869, the house exhibits a high degree of craftsmanship that makes it one of the best examples of this design in this region of northern Kentucky.

The style combined with the plan (Gothic Revival, cross-axis) appears to be somewhat unusual for the regions outside northern Kentucky, but not uncommon however, in this particular area. The expertise and skill evident in the construction of this building makes it one of the superior examples of this design. The fine brickwork is one of the features of note. Also, the round arched hood molds on the second story windows are uncommonly well laid, with a deep but even profile.

The interior molding and woodwork are among the outstanding features of the house. Although not elaborate, the ceiling friezes are detailed and finely crafted. Of special interest are the mantle elements. In addition to a superior mantlepiece, the ornate iron grates and richly colored ceramic tiles of the hearth are particularly noteworthy.

The house was constructed on Sparta Pike by Henry Clay Peak (1832-1913), a Confederate Civil War veteran who resided here until 1881.


