

	Although altered, the house appears to be early. The cellar walls have been cemented over, so early hatches, etc. are not discernable.

We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.
