Outside measurements 30 ft x 30 ft. Lower portion of building and the fireplace are constructed of native stone. The upper section is shingle covered. (brown stain) The roof is shingle, natural color. Windows and trim are painted white. The front porch is 30 ft x 8 ft. It is supported by two large log pillars atop massive rock bases. Rustic log railings. (The porch roof extends around a large pine tree.)

The entire area is shaded by tall ponderosa pine. The building is on a small hill above the road, with well graded foot path leading to it from the parking area. (the foot path is hard surfaced, the sides are lined with stone, and has rustic pole hand rails.)

Contents of the building include Badger Clark's personal belongings, his library, and all of the furniture, just as he left them - in perfect order.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			ON CR

Badger Clark - past poet laureate of South Dakota was bearn in 1883 at Albion Iowa. He arrived in the Black Hills while still a small boy. His writing career began, when while a youth he was recovering from tuberculosis on an Arizona ranch. His mother had submitted one of his poems to the Pacific Monthly, for which the magazine paid Clark the sum of \$10.00. This was what he was looking for, a job without a boss and without hours. His health restored, young Clark returned to the Black Hills and leased a cabin site in 1910, in Custer State Park. He built a small cabin, which was his home while he was building the present "Badger Hole". In his free time he continued his writing career.

Clark did a professional job in constructing his home, being as meticulous in building as he was in his personal habits. One feature is the fire place, located in the main room. It is made entirely of white felspar, set in place with dark cement. Besides the main room, which houses the library and pictures, there is a kitchen (With an old wood range) and a modest bedroom. Badger scorned the use of modern conveniences, the building had no electricity, and he carried water from a spring.

A man of high ideals, he was able to express in verse his love of nature and mankind. Most of his poems were of the West, its creatures and its characters. Some were strictly for entertainment, the majority had a bit of his own personal philosophy.

Badger Clark died September 26, 1957 in South Dakota and the country had lost a remarkably talented and gentle citizen.

The State acquired the Badger Hole from Clark's heirs - on the condition that it be maintained as a museum. There is a possibility that the State Park will not be able to do so much longer.
