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7 DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The three story Douglas County Courthouse is 81.2 feet long and 61.2 feet wide. Its facing consists of reddish-brown brick and in a flemish bond a light select grev stock of Indian oolitic limestone from the Bedford district. The latter material is used mainly on the front facade and cornice line. The lower floor is rusticated.

The architectural firm of Perkins and McWayne of Sioux Falls designed the building in a simplifed Neo-classic mode. The front facade displays four engaged fonic columns round arched windows between them. The other main classical element is the denticulated cornice. The three round arched openings have two sets of windows, keystones and modillion work in the top section. Above the main door is an entablature with egg and dart moulding and a cartouche. The projection of the podium that flanks each side of the steps displays Beaux Arts Cast iron light fixtures.

Almost all the windows are coupled with mullions and only the third floor has a decorative top surround which is flat with voussouirs as keystone. The remaining openings are flat-topped; all have slipsills.

Tennessee Tavernelle marble along with plaster and red oak trim decorate the interior of the courthouse. The floor has tile design number 2, Lombardic which was made by the American Encoustic Tile Company.

The auditor's building, built 1902, is a small one story, rectangular shaped structure. A red colored pressed brick that was manufactured by the Twin Brick Company appears as the main facing material while the trim brick came from the Hydraulic Pressed Brick Company in Omaha.

The major decorative feature is an arcaded cornice; this round arch design also appears on the single stack chimney. The windows have lintel and slipsill surrounds of limestone material. The rear facade is devoid of any openings. The only entry feature is a transom.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architecturally the 1927 courthouse is the only example of Neo-classic style in Armour and probably in the county. The old auditor's building, now the Douglas County Museum is good as an example of a small venacular building with Romanesque elements. Another obvious importance is that the buildings have served for the most part the county government. It is also the legal center for the area with circuit and county courts. Over the years various events have occurred within the walls that shaped the history of the county.

The city of Armour in the late 1890's was the second largest rail producer in the state. This was because it was the end of the road for the Milwaakee railroad. Over 1400 rail cars were sent east in 1897. Because of the railroad, Armour became the county seat.

The structure which now houses the museum served as the clerk of courts and auditor's office. The town had to construct the building because of state law that stated certain records had to be kept in a fire proof building. The architectural firm of W. L. Dow and Sons designed the structure while M.C. Momson was the builder. Total cost for construction - \$3,625.

The Douglas County Courthouse, designed by Perkins and McWayne, of Sioux Falls, and built by Gray construction Company of Watertown. The cost for this was \$150,000; it was said to have been the first building in the state to have records in racks¹⁶ rather than locked in safes. The old wooden courthouse was old and was torn down.

Both these buildings are locally significant to the population of Douglas County.
