Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Ward Community Church is a simple vernacular frame church located in the historic metal mining community of Ward, Colorado. The building is located in the heart of the community on one of the many steep slopes within the mountain town. It is surrounded by residential development, primarily historic houses. The church is a prominent part of the cultural landscape of the community. Its distinctive ecclesiastical lines combined with its dramatic hillside location create a picturesque scene that contributes much to the historic alpine character of Ward.

The church building is one of the few remaining historic structures in town today. Like the school, the uphill position and concerted efforts to protect the church building saved it from the 1900 fire that destroyed the lower buildings of Ward. It has been in continual use as a church since its original construction. As a result, the building has been maintained, unlike many other older buildings of the town, and its integrity and distinctive architectural features have been preserved.

The Ward Church is a rectangular one story structure built into the hillside with its side elevations barely visible from the street. The roof is front gabled with a steep slope and is corrugated metal. Typical of the institutional buildings of this period, the church is sided with clapboard.

Although the Ward Church is a vernacular style building, there are several distinctive features that embellish its facade. The gable is trimmed with decorative bargeboards held in place with rosette-shaped fasteners. Lancet windows, a common ecclesiastical window form, flank the entrance to the building. Also, a pointed arch transom heads the entry door and a round window decorates the gable. The transom and round window have been boarded over but their forms remain discernible. The Ward Community Church meets the registration requirements of the Multiple Property Nomination of "Metal Mining and Tourist Era Resources of Boulder County." It is an excellent example of the Vernacular Community Institutional Building property type because of the unchanged condition of its original design, materials, and workmanship. Additionally, the minimal disturbance to its setting supports the integrity of feeling and association for the historic building. As a result, the church is a valuable example of an earlier developmental period and style of building in Boulder County's mining towns.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Ward Church is nominated under Criterion Consideration A for its architectural significance. It meets Criterion C as an excellent intact example of a 19th century vernacular church. Its design is characteristic of churches in Colorado's mountain mining communities. The building also meets criterion A for its association with the history of Ward, Colorado, and early mining settlement. It is representative of those 19th century institutions which were part of the physical and social development of the late 19th century mining towns of Colorado.

The church is being nominated as part of the Multiple Property nomination, "Metal Mining and Tourist Era Resources of Boulder County." The church meets the registration requirements for the Vernacular Institutional Buildings associated property type. The history of this building is part of the Multiple Property's associated historic context "Early Settlement and Community Development in the Mountain Region of Boulder County, 1858-1910."

Ward was one of the first mining centers in Boulder County and dates from 1860 when Calvin Ward discovered gold along Lefthand Creek at 9,000 feet elevation in the mountain region of the county. The following year the Columbia vein was discovered on Niwot Hill by Cyprus Deardoff. This vein proved to be rich in both gold and silver, supporting numerous mining enterprises and producing millions of dollars of ore over its lifetime. Ward quickly grew from a camp to a full-scale settlement, as the area mines attracted settlers and created a demand for a variety of commercial concerns. By 1867, the population of the town was 200. As the 1800s progressed, the growth and prosperity of Ward were uneven, like most mining communities in the county and state. However, production of the Ward mining district, as well as expectations for future wealth, was such that the area continued to grow. By 1890, its population reached 2100. (x) See continuation sheet

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The Ward Church, constructed in 1894-1895 meets criteria A because it was part of the turn of the century development of the community that was associated with the growth and diversification of the population following the 1893 Silver Crash. The simple, yet distinctive, construction of the church attests to Ward's prosperity during this period and illustrated the presence of organized religion in the social life of the community. The church has architectural significance because of its intact design, materials and workmanship which are typical of the building traditions of the period and make it an excellent example of the style of construction used for community buildings during this time in Boulder County. Consequently, the Ward Church is an important historic and architectural resource that should be recognized and preserved accordingly.
